Enhancing national delivery systems through operational partners



The Operational Partners Implementation Modality (OPIM) was established in response to an increasing demand from beneficiary countries and resource partners to carry out FAO projects in collaboration with national and non-profit actors. This partnership approach facilitates engagement with strategic operational partners in an attempt to achieve a world free of hunger and malnutrition.

By implementing projects jointly with operational partners, FAO is:

- Oetting its expertise closer to the ground
- Increasing impact on the field
- Tapping into the know-how of national professionals and local organizations
- Building deeper partnerships with operational partners
- Strengthening national ownership and achieving sustainable results
- Delivering its strategic framework in a decentralized manner



Mobilizing additional resources at country level



- » FAO has transferred USD 120 million to operational partners at country level to implement FAO projects. Projects currently under development include further transfer of some USD 142 million.
- » Resource partners have expressed their preference for operational partnerships with national entities and other eligible partners.
- » FAO works with 66 operational partners, including governments, intergovernmental organizations, national and international NGOs, and research institutes.
- » **31 OPIM** projects are being implemented worldwide, and an additional **20 OPIM** projects are under development.
- » Adequate assurance activities, to monitor that funds are used for intended purposes in line with work plan and budget, and that agreed results are timely achieved, have been put in place by FAO.

"The FAO-GEF portfolio is comprised of over 140 projects valued at over USD 640 million. To date approximately 20 percent of this portfolio is being implemented under the OPIM.
