## PLANNED ACTIVITIES 2021-2023

 Revisit the working group's five-year strategic plan. The current plan focuses on the following priority work areas:

- Forest health monitoring and analysis, including urban forest health issues.
- Impacts and adaptation to variations in climate and forest conditions.
- Intergovernmental coordination to address shared forest pest issues.
- > Maintenance of scientific capacity to support science-based programs and policies.



## PLANNED ACTIVITIES 2021-2023

- ✓ Forest insects and diseases of concern to Canada, Mexico and the United States:
  - Update to a NAFC report on this topic published in 1967.
- Advance discussion on a collaborative project about forest health monitoring in Mexico





#### Lessons learned, challenges and issues for the attention of Commissioners

- Travel restrictions have limited the ability of the working group to meet. Virtual options are not suitable for practical workshops/training that require physical presence of participants.
- ✓ In alignment with discussions at the last two Commission's meeting, and based on current working group membership and priorities, it is recommended to limit the scope of the working group to insects and diseases.
