



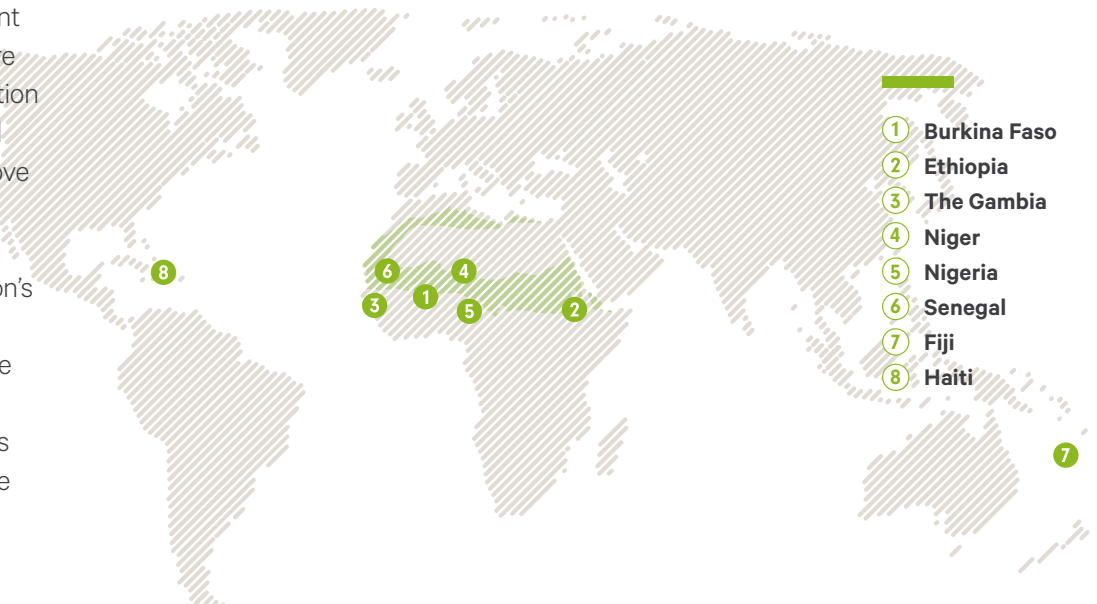
ACTION AGAINST DESERTIFICATION

EXPANDING AFRICA'S GREAT GREEN WALL

Desertification and land degradation are very serious challenges. They lead to hunger and poverty, drive unemployment, forced migration and conflict, while increasing the risk of extreme weather related to climate change. But recent achievements in restoration and sustainable land management show that these problems are not insurmountable. Bold action and investments are needed to boost food security, improve livelihoods and help people adapt to a changing climate. Action Against Desertification's successful approach has paved the way for large-scale restoration in support of small-scale farming. Now, it is being expanded in Africa, the Caribbean and the Pacific.

Action Against Desertification supports local communities, government and civil society in six African countries - Burkina Faso, Ethiopia, The Gambia, Niger, Nigeria and Senegal – as well as in Fiji and Haiti to restore degraded land and to manage fragile ecosystems in a sustainable way. It is using a mix of the following activities:

- **LARGE-SCALE RESTORATION** of degraded agrosilvopastoral systems, putting local communities at the centre of restoration by focussing on native species that are useful for their environment and livelihoods.
- **DIVERSIFICATION OF ECONOMIC** activities by reinforcing value chains of non-timber forest products with a direct link to restoration in order to stimulate job creation and income generating opportunities, particularly for women and youth.
- **STRENGTHENING THE CAPACITIES** of individuals, communities and organizations in the sustainable management of degraded land.
- **MONITORING AND EVALUATION** to track progress made by the project and measure its bio-physical and socio-economic impact.
- **KNOWLEDGE EXCHANGE** and raising awareness about the causes of land degradation and desertification, and the best ways to combat and prevent them.
