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Procedure of the Session

Introductory Items¹

1. The 174th Session of the Council was held from 4 to 8 December 2023 under the Chairpersonship of Dr Hans Hoogeveen, Independent Chairperson of the Council.

2. The Council <u>confirmed</u>, pursuant to Rule VIII of the Rules of Procedure of the Council, that it agreed to the suspension of any rules incompatible with the hybrid setting, specifically Rule II.3 of the Rules of Procedure of the Council, which provides that each session of the Council shall be held at the seat of the Organization.

Statement by the Director-General²

3. The Director-General, Dr QU Dongyu, delivered a statement to Council.

Adoption of the Agenda and Timetable³

- 4. The Council <u>adopted</u> the Agenda and Timetable for the Session, as amended.
- 5. The Council <u>approved</u> the methods of work outlined in documents CL 174/INF/5, *Methods of Work for the 174th Session of the Council*, and CL 174/INF/5 Corr.1, *Methods of Work for the 174th Session of the Council Corrigendum*.
- 6. The Agenda is given in *Appendix A* to this Report.

Election of three Vice-Chairpersons, and designation of the Chairperson and Members of the Drafting Committee⁴

- 7. The Council elected three Vice-Chairpersons for its Session: Mr Ennio Vivaldi Véjar (Chile); Ms Erma Rheindrayani (Indonesia); and Ms Stefania Costanza (Italy).
- 8. The Council elected Mr Anatoliy Shatkovskyy (Canada) as Chairperson of the Drafting Committee with the following membership: Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, Chile, China, Egypt, Germany, Indonesia, Japan, Morocco, Peru, Spain and Sudan.

Programmatic Matters

Adjustments to the Programme of Work and Budget 2024-25⁵

- 9. The Council <u>endorsed</u> the Reports of the Programme Committee, the Finance Committee, and their Joint Meeting with respect to the *Adjustments to the Programme of Work and Budget 2024-25*.
- 10. The Council:
 - a) noted the Adjustments to the Programme of Work and Budget (PWB) 2024-25, and <u>highlighted</u> the guidance and decisions of the Conference on the Medium Term Plan (Reviewed) 2022-25 and Programme of Work and Budget 2024-25, taking into account the guidance of the Conference;
 - b) <u>stressed the importance</u> of advancing science- and evidence-based normative and standard-setting work, including funding for Codex Alimentarius and the International

- Plant Protection Convention (IPPC) along with its ePhyto Solutions, and data and statistics to serve the public good;
- c) further <u>stressed the importance</u> of protecting and funding the technical work of FAO, including the Technical Cooperation Programme (TCP) and Global Farmer Field School (FFS) Platform;
- d) noted the importance of protecting and funding intergovernmental arrangements, such as the Committee on World Food Security (CFS), the International Treaty on Plant Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture (ITPGRFA), the Commission on Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture (CGRFA), and the Commission on Phytosanitary Measures (CPM), supporting FAO's mandate on agriculture and food security, taking into account their respective administrative and budgetary matters;
- e) welcomed the additional information received on the Office of Youth and Women (OYW) and, provided that its staffing would have no negative impact on the capacity of normative work, gender mainstreaming, statistics and climate, endorsed the establishment of OYW, and emphasized the need to continue strengthening the mainstreaming and advocating for youth, gender equality and rural women's empowerment, both internally within the Organization and across FAO's mandate;
- f) noted that OYW will work, in coordination with the Human Resources Division, on the empowerment of young professionals within the Organization with due consideration for underrepresented countries;
- g) <u>highlighted</u> the guidance given by the 43rd Session of the Conference on priority areas as referred to in sub-paragraph (e), <u>underscored</u> that the establishment of the OYW should not be at the expense of staffing and implementation of these priority areas, and should avoid overlap, and underscored its cross-cutting nature;
- h) <u>looked forward</u> to a progress update on the establishment of the OYW to Council at its next session, for guidance on its implementation, and <u>called for</u> FAO to develop a work plan, including a results framework related to this office, and report back on its activities at a future session of the Council:
- i) <u>endorsed</u> the proposed transfers of the private sector partnerships function from the Resource Mobilization and Private Sector Partnerships Division (PSR) to the Partnerships and UN Collaboration Division (PSU), and of the Global Farmer Field School (FFS) Platform team from the Plant Production and Protection Division (NSP) to the Office of Innovation (OIN);
- j) appreciated the information provided on savings and efficiency measures, recommended
 that Management develop a business plan and roadmap detailing planned initiatives and
 expected efficiency gains and savings, together with measurement indicators, and
 requested regular annual reporting on efficiencies and savings, both accrued and
 anticipated;
- k) supported the updated FAO Results Framework 2022-25 (CL 174/3 Annex 1);
- l) <u>endorsed</u> the revised budgeted post establishment (Section III.B and CL 174/3 Annex 6) and the revised Organizational Chart (CL 174/3 Annex 7);
- m) noted the estimates for extra budgetary resources (Table 2 of document CL 174/3), <u>encouraged</u> Members to provide voluntary contributions to facilitate the achievement of the FAO Strategic Framework 2022-31 and implementation of the integrated PWB, and looked forward to receiving regular updates;
- n) <u>underscored</u> the importance of strengthening and expanding partnerships and strategic alliances, <u>recognized</u> the important and instrumental role of South-South and Triangular Cooperation (SSTC), and <u>reiterated</u> the importance of strengthened partnership arrangements to achieve the Programme Priority Areas (PPAs);

o) noted FAO's plans for the establishment of regional knowledge hubs, and <u>looked forward</u> to further updates at its future sessions;

- p) <u>stressed the importance</u> of Management and Members continuing dialogue on all sources of funds with the full spectrum of financial resources, and <u>recommended</u> Management to develop a comprehensive approach for the funding of the Organization and provide regular updates to Members, including through the Programme Implementation Report (PIR); and
- q) <u>looked forward</u> to reporting on the implementation of the PWB 2024-25, in line with the established reporting process.
- 11. The Council <u>approved</u> the revised distribution of the net appropriation by budgetary chapter as reflected in Table 1 of document CL 174/3 Corr.1.

Global food security challenges and drivers⁶

- 12. The Council <u>appreciated</u> document CL 174/4, *Global food security challenges and its drivers*, and in particular:
 - a) noted with concern the lack of progress on improved food security at the global, regional and national levels, noted with concern the growing rate of acute global food insecurity, and highlighted the need to make more and immediate progress on the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly SDG 2 (Zero Hunger);
 - b) recognized the urgent need for countries and the international community to work together to address the main drivers of undernourishment and food insecurity in the world: conflicts, wars and geopolitical tensions, extreme and more frequent climatic events, economic slowdowns and downturns, and persistent inequalities;
 - c) <u>stressed the need</u> for policies and programmes to address higher levels of food insecurity among women compared to men in all regions of the world, and higher levels of food insecurity among residents of rural areas in many countries;
 - d) recognized that the challenges are enormous and require concerted and sustained
 efforts to meet both the short- and longer-term objectives, including through urgent
 and adequate humanitarian assistance, social protection programmes, increased
 investments in agrifood systems, rural development, trade, data, information and
 technologies;
 - e) <u>stressed the significance</u> of market transparency, and <u>emphasized</u> the importance of timely and credible market information provided by the Agricultural Market Information System (AMIS), amongst others;
 - f) stressed the need for continued urgent humanitarian assistance in the wider context of the humanitarian-development-peace (HDP) nexus, including the scaling up of agricultural interventions and longer-term investments in FAO's resilience-building activities, which provides those reached with urgently needed, life-saving and cost-effective agricultural assistance;
 - g) reiterated its support for transformation, in accordance with and dependent on national contexts and capacities, to achieve the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, towards sustainable and resilient agrifood systems in line with the FAO Strategic Framework 2022-31;
 - h) <u>expressed appreciation</u> for the statistical work of FAO as the leading agency producing timely and evidence-based data and information on food and agriculture, and efforts for monitoring the food security and nutrition situation;

 i) encouraged FAO to work collaboratively with Rome-based Agencies (RBAs) and Member countries to enhance data collection and analysis, and build capacity at regional and subregional levels, to produce disaggregated reporting that can identify subregional variations and priorities, based on the availability of additional extra-budgetary resources;

- j) <u>underlined</u> the importance of keeping open the trade of food and agriculture inputs and products in order to avoid the negative impact on global food security, while also preventing trade distortions and unjustified trade barriers in this respect;
- k) took note of diverse views expressed by Members regarding the impact of economic, financial and trade measures on food security and nutrition during the global food crisis, in line with paragraph 30 of Agenda 2030 on Sustainable Development; and
- recognized FAO's efforts to address hunger and food insecurity in the world, and encouraged its continued responsiveness, emphasizing the value of its normative work and global role as a science- and evidence-based knowledge organization for food security and agriculture.

The situation in Gaza related to food security and related matters under the mandate of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO)⁸

- 13. The Council voted⁹ in favour of the ruling of the Independent Chairperson of the Council (ICC) on a point of order raised by the United States of America.¹⁰
- 14. The Council voted^{11,12,13} in favour of a motion by Indonesia to move directly to vote on the Draft Decision contained in document, CL 174/INF/11 *en bloc* without amendments.
- 15. The Council <u>decided</u> by vote^{14,15,16} to adopt the Draft Decision contained in document CL 174/INF/11.

16. **The Council:**

- a) noted with concern the growing rate of acute global food insecurity and the need to reverse this trend to make progress on the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly SDG 2 (Zero hunger);
- b) <u>endorsed</u> and re-affirmed UN Security Council Resolution S/RES/2712, as well as UN General Assembly Resolution A/RES/ES-10/21 on the protection of civilians and upholding, legal and humanitarian obligations in the Gaza Strip;
- c) <u>expressed grave concern</u> over the catastrophic humanitarian situation in the

- Occupied Palestinian Territory, particularly in the Gaza Strip and its vast consequences against the civilian population, with particular reference to the disproportionate impact on children;
- d) <u>underlined</u> the urgent need for full, rapid, safe, and unhindered access of essential goods and services to civilians throughout the Gaza Strip, including but not limited to water, food, medical supplies, and energy;
- e) <u>stressed</u> that forced displacement of the civilian population, including children, is considered a violation of international law, including international humanitarian law and international human rights law, thereby expanding the status of food insecurity on the national, regional, and international levels;
- f) welcomed the latest humanitarian pause agreed by the parties and called for an immediate, durable, and sustained humanitarian truce leading to a cessation of hostilities:
- g) took note of the statement of FAO Director-General, which confirmed that the Organization considers all the civilian population in Gaza to be food insecure;
- h) <u>expressed strong support</u> towards the efforts of the United Nations Secretary-General and for his calls for the immediate and unrestricted access of humanitarian aid to respond to the most basic needs of the Palestinian civilian population in the Gaza Strip and expressed its appreciation of the critical role played by Egypt in this regard;
- i) <u>expressed strong support</u> also for all regional and international efforts aimed at achieving an immediate cessation of the use of force, including the targeting of civilians, civilian food supply, and agricultural infrastructure, in the Gaza Strip;
- j) <u>stressed the necessity</u> to refrain from using food and water as weapons of war in conflict areas:
- k) <u>underlined</u> the importance of keeping open the trade and distribution of food and agricultural inputs and products to avert the negative impact on food security;
- recalled the FAO voluntary guidelines to support the progressive realization of the right to adequate food in the context of national and regional food security and its relevant application in the context of the situation in the Occupied Palestinian Territory particularly in the Gaza Strip;
- m) stressed the role of FAO, in coordination and cooperation with other United Nations entities and relevant bodies, particularly with the Rome-based agencies and international financial institutions, to assess and address, within their respective mandates, the impact of the conflict on food security, nutrition, agriculture, and fisheries in the Occupied Palestinian Territory particularly in the Gaza Strip;

n) requested FAO:

- to continue, within its mandate, its support to the humanitarian aid coordinated by the United Nations;
- ii. to monitor the consequences towards food security in the region, including the functioning of Agri-Food systems, as well as the availability of water resources;
- iii. to develop immediate, medium-term, and longer-term plans that address the impact of the conflict in the Gaza Strip on national and regional food security, including emergency response, recovery assistance, and resilience building of Agri-food systems;

iv. to explore immediate and suitable ways that function across the humanitarian-development-peace nexus to not only meet the immediate needs of forcibly displaced civilians in the Gaza Strip, but also to seek long- term solutions;

- v. to keep Members posted in this regard through regular briefings, consultations, and reporting within the FAO Governing Bodies; and
- vi. to insert this matter into the agenda of the next regular session of the FAO Council in June 2024.

The impact of the war in Ukraine on global food security and related matters under the mandate of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO)¹⁷

17. The Council <u>decided</u> by vote¹⁸ to adopt the Draft Decision contained in document CL 174/INF/13.

18. The Council:

- a) <u>recalled</u> its decisions and recommendations of its 169th, 170th, 171st and 172nd sessions, as well as the report of the 43rd session of the FAO Conference, and <u>stressed</u> the need to continue their full implementation;
- b) deplored the unilateral termination of the Initiative on the Safe Transportation of Grain and Foodstuffs from Ukrainian Ports, known as the "Black Sea Grain Initiative (BSGI)", by the Russian Federation on 18 July 2023, stressing the benefits that this Initiative has brought along for global food security by enabling the safe transportation of nearly 33 million metric tons of grains and other foodstuffs from Ukraine to 45 countries across three continents;
- c) <u>reiterated</u> its call for the immediate cessation of attacks on Ukraine's critical agriculture and energy infrastructure, noting in particular the systematic attacks on ports that followed the termination of the Black Sea Grain Initiative;
- d) <u>stressed</u> again the need to allow for the full resumption of Ukrainian agricultural production and its unimpeded export from Ukraine, including via the Black Sea;
- e) welcomed the "Grain from Ukraine" humanitarian initiative carried out in partnership with the World Food Programme, under which more than 170,000 tons of Ukrainian grain have already been delivered to Somalia, Ethiopia, Kenya, and Yemen;
- f) recalled its decision to remain seized of this matter.
- 19. The Council <u>decided</u> by vote¹⁹ to reject the Draft Decision contained in document CL 174/INF/14.

Update on the Hand-in-Hand Initiative²⁰

- 20. The Council <u>welcomed</u> document CL 174/INF/6, *Update on the Hand-in-Hand Initiative*, and in particular:
 - a) <u>appreciated</u> the continued growth in the number of member countries participating in the Initiative, with 67 countries signed up by November 2023;

- b) <u>appreciated</u> the Hand-in-Hand (HIH) technical support to Members on the design, planning, and analysis for increased and targeted investments to accelerate agrifood systems transformation, in support of SDGs 1, 2 and 10;
- c) welcomed the ongoing efforts by the HIH Initiative to support Members to include climate actions (e.g. increased use of the EX-Ante Carbon-balance Tool [ExACT]) in their investment plans for enhancing engagements with a wider range of investors;
- d) <u>welcomed</u> the reported engagements of HIH across all *four betters* and in a range of PPAs, such as Investment, and Food Loss and Waste as a few examples;
- e) <u>encouraged</u> the ongoing development of the HIH monitoring and evaluation dashboard and further reporting on progress of the Initiative;
- f) <u>emphasized</u> the need for additional voluntary, technical and financial support for the Initiative; and
- g) noting the increase in demand from member countries for HIH's support, and the positive feedback from Members on the Hand-in-Hand Investment Forum, welcomed increased partnerships in the form of investment opportunities to support the HIH Initiative.

Reports of the Committees of the Council

Report of the Joint Meeting of the 137th Session of the Programme Committee and 198th Session of the Finance Committee (Rome, November 2023)²¹

- 21. The Council <u>reviewed</u> the Report of the Joint Meeting of the 137th Session of the Programme Committee and 198th Session of the Finance Committee, noting that the *Adjustments to the Programme of Work and Budget 2024-25* and the *Update on FAO's collaboration with other UN system entities* would be reviewed as separate items, and <u>endorsed</u> its conclusions on:
 - a) the Implementation of integrated water resources management: progress and needs;
 - b) the Follow-up from the UN Food Systems Summit +2 Stocktaking Moment; and
 - c) the Annual Report on Corporate Policy, Processes and Measures on the Prevention of Harassment, Sexual Harassment and Sexual Exploitation and Abuse.

Report of the 137th Session of the Programme Committee (Rome, 6-10 November 2023)²²

- 22. The Council <u>reviewed</u> the Report of the 137th Session of the Programme Committee, noting that the *Adjustments to the Programme of Work and Budget 2024-25* and the *Update on the Hand-in-Hand Initiative* would be reviewed as separate items, and:
 - a) noted the considerations on the Vision for Adapted Crops and Soils (VACS); the Strengthening science-policy interfaces for agrifood systems; the FAO's Forestry Roadmap: from Vision to Action; the Update on the One Country One Priority Product (OCOP) Initiative; the outcomes of the FAO Global Conference on Sustainable Livestock Transformation; and the FAO Global Conference on Sustainable Agricultural Mechanization (GAMC);
 - b) <u>agreed</u> with its conclusions on the *Evaluation of FAO's support to life below water* (SDG 14) and Management Response, and the Follow-up report on the Evaluation of

- c) further <u>agreed</u> with its conclusions on the Contribution of terrestrial animal source food to healthy diets for improved nutrition, the FAO's Conceptual framework for integrated land and water resources management, the Update on FAO response to global food security challenges, and the FAO innovation and technology accelerators: a fit-for-purpose business model to ensure an inclusive, efficient, resilient and sustainable agrifood system transformation; and
- d) commended the work on developing the comprehensive conceptual framework for water resources management; and in this regard, welcomed Management's commitment to reporting this work during the biennium 2024-25 including on its concrete impact in relevant PPAs, programmatic initiatives, resources and partnerships.

Bioeconomy for sustainable food and agriculture²³

- 23. The Council took note of the observations of the 137th Session of the Programme Committee on Bioeconomy for sustainable food and agriculture, and:
 - a) <u>welcomed</u> the information provided on FAO's work on bioeconomy for sustainable food and agriculture;
 - b) <u>appreciated</u> the progress made in the implementation of the PPA: Bioeconomy for Sustainable Food and Agriculture;
 - c) <u>acknowledged</u> the important role that bioeconomy can play in agrifood systems transformation; and
 - d) <u>looked forward</u> to further discussion within Technical Committees and other Governing Bodies of FAO.
- 24. With the observations contained in paragraphs 22 and 23, the Council <u>endorsed</u> the recommendations of the Report.

Reports of the 196th (Rome, 5-7 June 2023), 197th (Rome, 30-31 October 2023) and 198th (Rome, 6-10 November 2023) Sessions of the Finance Committee²⁴

- 25. The Council <u>reviewed</u> the Reports of the 196th (Rome, 5-7 June 2023), 197th (Rome, 30-31 October 2023) and 198th (Rome, 6-10 November 2023) Sessions of the Finance Committee, noting that the *Adjustments to the Programme of Work and Budget 2024-25* would be reviewed as a separate agenda item, and:

 - ii. <u>endorse</u> the appointment of Mr Jorge da Silva as a member of the FAO Oversight Advisory Committee for an initial period of three years.
- 26. In addition, the Council <u>endorsed</u> the conclusions of the Finance Committee on:

- 28. With the above observations, the Council <u>endorsed</u> the recommendations of the Reports of the 196th, 197th and 198th Sessions of the Finance Committee.

Committee on World Food Security

Report of the 51st Session of the Committee on World Food Security (Rome, 23-27 October and 25 November 2023)²⁶

- 31. The Council <u>welcomed</u> the Report of the 51st Session of the Committee on World Food Security (CFS), and <u>recommended</u> the aspects falling under its mandate for endorsement by the Conference, and:
 - a) <u>commended</u> the CFS for the endorsement of the *Voluntary Guidelines on Gender Equality* and *Women's and Girls' Empowerment in the Context of Food Security and Nutrition*, and <u>encouraged</u> the RBAs and other relevant actors to support their utilization at country level;
 - b) <u>commended</u> the CFS for the endorsement of the CFS Policy Recommendations on Strengthening Collection and Use of Food Security and Nutrition (FSN) Data and Related Analysis Tools to Improve Decision-Making in Support of the Progressive Realization of

- the Right to Adequate Food in the Context of National Food Security, and encouraged the RBAs and other relevant actors to support their utilization at country level;
- emphasized the importance of increased collection, analysis and dissemination of data on all dimensions of food security and nutrition for evidence-based decision-making, and encouraged FAO and other RBAs to continue to assist Members in strengthening their capacity to apply the newly endorsed guidelines;
- d) <u>welcomed</u> the CFS Multi-Year Programme of Work 2024-2027, with its cross-cutting focus areas, prioritized thematic workstreams, and supporting activities, as a comprehensive framework to support the progressive realization of the right to adequate food in the context of national food security, and the achievement of SDG 2;
- encouraged the RBAs, including FAO, to honour their commitment to equally share the
 costs of the CFS Secretariat, either through cash or in-kind contributions, as a symbol of
 joint ownership and shared commitment to the Committee via effective RBA
 collaboration;
- f) <u>encouraged</u>, in line with the CFS Reform Document, FAO, IFAD and WFP, as well as other CFS stakeholders, to provide space for CFS considerations in the agendas of their Governing Bodies and Regional Conferences, as appropriate;
- g) welcomed the 18th Report of CFS High-Level Panel of Experts on Food Security and Nutrition (HLPE-FSN), entitled *Reducing Inequalities for Food Security and Nutrition*, and looked forward to the elaboration of an agreed set of policy recommendations to be presented for endorsement at CFS 52 in October 2024; and
- h) <u>congratulated</u> the outgoing Chairperson Mr Gabriel Ferrero y de Loma-Osorio and acknowledged his leadership, and <u>congratulated</u> the incoming Chairperson Ms Nosipho Nausca-Jean Jezile and expressed support for her leadership.

Governance Matters

Update on FAO's collaboration with other UN system entities²⁷

32. The Council:

- a) <u>welcomed</u> the update on FAO's collaboration with UN system entities, acknowledged the foundational importance of RBA collaboration, and <u>commended</u> the Organization for its ongoing efforts to diversify and strengthen its thematic collaborations with other UN entities at the global, regional and country levels;
- b) encouraged FAO, within its mandate, to enhance its collaboration across the UN system in support of achieving the SDGs by leveraging joint funding mechanisms, developing policy tools to facilitate the integration of the agrifood systems approach in key UN development system frameworks at the global, regional and country levels, and by strengthening FAO's partnerships with UN Resident Coordinators and UN Country Teams;
- c) <u>welcomed</u> the new tripartite Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between the RBAs, and <u>appreciated</u> the six thematic areas of this collaboration;
- d) encouraged FAO to continue to bring its expertise in agriculture, agrifood systems, nutrition and rural development, in the context of the UN system, including the case of negotiations on climate change; and
- e) <u>looked forward</u> to future updates on the progress, challenges and impact of FAO's collaboration with other UN system entities.

Report of the 19th Regular Session of the Commission on Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture (Rome, 17-21 July 2023)²⁸

- 33. The Council <u>endorsed</u> the conclusions and recommendations contained in the Report of the 19th Regular Session of the Commission on Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture, and in particular:
 - a) <u>adopted</u> Council Resolution 1/174, *The Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework*, set out in *Appendix D*; and
 - b) <u>endorsed</u> the establishment of the Intergovernmental Technical Working Group on Microorganism and Invertebrate Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture and the Ad Hoc Expert Team on Biodiversity for Food and Agriculture.

Participation of private sector observers in sessions of the FAO Governing Bodies²⁹

- 34. The Council <u>welcomed</u> the following principles to guide the implementation of participation of international non-governmental organizations (INGOs), including those classed as private sector, in FAO Governing and Statutory Bodies:
 - a) FAO is an intergovernmental body, which means that decisions are taken by its Members. INGOs, including the private sector, are observers and cannot participate in the negotiations and decision-making process;
 - b) implementation of the rules and procedures for participation of INGOs shall be in line with FAO Basic Texts, and should be transparent;
 - c) INGOs may, in accordance with the rules and procedures in the Basic Texts, be given the possibility to make a statement in a Governing Body or Statutory Body meeting that they participate in;
 - d) participation should be inclusive, flexible and regionally balanced, including regionally based and regionally focused INGOs who can contribute to FAO's work. In this regard, FAO Regional Conferences could give further guidance; and
 - e) individual companies are excluded from participating in Governing and Statutory Body meetings.
- 35. The Council <u>recommended</u> FAO to examine possibilities for clearer guidance to the Secretariats of its Governing and Statutory Bodies on the participation of INGOs in its meetings, and to develop further proposals for practical modalities for participation, where necessary and in close consultation with, and guidance from, CCLM.
- 36. The Council <u>looked forward</u> to future updates on the progress on participation of private sector observers in sessions of the FAO Governing Bodies.

Status of implementation of decisions taken at the 172nd Session of the Council (Rome, 24-28 April 2023)³⁰

37. The Council took note of the status of implementation of decisions taken at its 172nd Session.

38. The Council, pursuant to FAO Conference Resolution 7/2011 of 2 July 2011, <u>elected</u> six members of the World Food Programme (WFP) Executive Board, for a period of three years (from 1 January 2024 to 31 December 2026) in accordance with the following distribution:

• List A: Morocco³² and Zimbabwe³³

• List C: Argentina³⁴

• List D: Ireland and Switzerland

List E: Hungary

Annual Report of the WFP Executive Board on its activities in 2022³⁵

39. The Council:

- a) <u>acknowledged</u> the WFP's Annual Performance Report (APR) and the results in meeting its Strategic Objectives, supported by Management Results Dimensions;
- b) recognized and appreciated the commitment of WFP staff in the field that worked in challenging circumstances to serve people in need, reaching almost 160 million people 25 percent more women, girls, boys and men in 2022 than in 2021 and responded to record levels of food insecurity, driven by conflicts, weather extremes, rapid inflation, the macroeconomic repercussions of the conflict in Ukraine and the continued impact of the COVID-19 pandemic;
- welcomed and commended WFP's ability to make progress in the diversification of its funding base, reaching an unprecedented total level of contributions of over USD 14 billion in 2022; and
- d) <u>supported</u> WFP's continued efforts to strengthen its collaboration with its many partners at all levels and its contributions to achieve the SDGs, especially SDG 2 and SDG 17.

Review of the Decentralized Offices Network of FAO³⁶

- 40. The Council welcomed the information document, and:
 - a) <u>appreciated</u> efforts implemented to address the efficiency and effectiveness of the business models of Decentralized Offices;
 - b) <u>welcomed</u> the completion of Restructuring of Regional and Subregional Offices under the principles of One FAO aiming to achieve a renewed business model, and <u>stressed the importance</u> of the continued monitoring of the performance of these Offices, including regular updates;

- e) encouraged continued efforts to ensure consistency in the deployment of technical resources across Country and Regional Offices, in line with One FAO; and
- f) looked forward to further information on the outcome of the Regional Conference discussions.

Five Years of Action for the Development of Mountain Regions³⁷

- 41. The Council took note of the information contained in CL 174/INF/8, and in particular:
 - a) noted the Global framework for the Five Years of Action for the Development of Mountain Regions 2023-2027;
 - b) recognized and reaffirmed the leading role of FAO as main agency for sustainable mountain development within the United Nations (UN) system;
 - c) called for the development of the Global Action Plan on Mountain Regions Development 2023-2027;
 - d) recommended FAO to support Members, subject to available extra-budgetary resources, with tools, methodologies and capacity-building activities to strengthen their capacity to scale-up sustainable mountain development initiatives with specific reference to the Five Years of Action:
 - e) encouraged FAO to continue supporting Members in raising awareness on the challenges, problems and opportunities of mountain regions, and enhancing global efforts to address them; and
 - looked forward to updates on the development of the Five Years of Action Plan in future sessions of the FAO Governing Bodies.

Appendix D

Resolution 1/174

The Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework

THE COUNCIL,

Recalling the three Global Goals of Members as included in the FAO Strategic Framework 2022-2031, especially Goal 3 on the sustainable management and utilization of natural resources, including land, water, air, climate and genetic resources for the benefit of present and future generations, and the FAO Strategic Framework 2022-2031 for the transformation to MORE efficient, inclusive, resilient and sustainable agrifood systems for better production, better nutrition, a better environment, and a better life, leaving no one behind;

Having noted the adoption, by the 15th Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity, of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework with its vision of a world of living in harmony with nature where "by 2050, biodiversity is valued, conserved, restored and wisely used, maintaining ecosystem services, sustaining a healthy planet and delivering benefits essential for all people";

Having considered the report of the Nineteenth Regular Session of the Commission on Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture (Commission);

Recognizing the importance of the Commission's Global Plans of Action, its Framework for Action on Biodiversity for Food and Agriculture, and other policy tools as voluntary frameworks for action at local, national, regional and global levels;

Recalling the importance of the International Treaty on Plant Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture (Treaty) and its support for the conservation and sustainable use of plant genetic resources for food and agriculture and equitable sharing of benefits derived from their use;

Recalling the importance of the International Plant Protection Convention and its support for the management of plant pests and diseases, including of invasive alien species;

Acknowledging the important work of the Commission, the Treaty and FAO in the development of targets and indicators for monitoring the implementation of their respective instruments and policies, as well as the achievement of the corresponding Sustainable Development Goals;

Noting the important role of the *FAO Strategy on Mainstreaming Biodiversity across Agricultural Sectors* and the 2024-27 Action Plan in coordinating FAO's assistance to countries in mainstreaming biodiversity across agricultural sectors;

Recognizing the important contribution FAO, the Commission, the Treaty, the International Plant Protection Convention can offer to the achievement of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework;

Stressing the mutual supportiveness of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework and instruments and policies of FAO on the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity for food and agriculture, and the fair and equitable sharing of benefits derived from genetic resources for food and agriculture;

- 1. Welcomes the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework;
- 2. *Requests* FAO and the Commission on Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture and encourages the Governing Body of the Treaty and the Commission on Phytosanitary Measures to contribute to the implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity

Framework, within their mandate and subject to the availability of resources and, for this purpose, to support countries in the implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework and collaborate with relevant stakeholders with a view to avoiding duplications and to enhancing effectiveness;

3. *Invites* Members to:

- consider integration of the Commission on Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture's sectoral Global Plans of Action, the Framework for Action on Biodiversity for Food and Agriculture and other FAO instruments and policies related to the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity into relevant policies, programmes and national and regional plans of action, including National Biodiversity Strategies and Action Plans (NBSAPs), as appropriate;
- ii. actively engage, and collaborate closely with all relevant sectors at all levels, as appropriate and in accordance with national circumstances, priorities and capabilities, in the transformation to more efficient, inclusive, resilient and sustainable agrifood systems that promote the sustainable use, conservation and restoration of biodiversity for food and agriculture, leaving no one behind; and
- iii. consider the importance of the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity for food and agriculture when seeking funding and support from various sources, including the Global Environment Facility, the Green Climate Fund and other relevant funding mechanisms.
