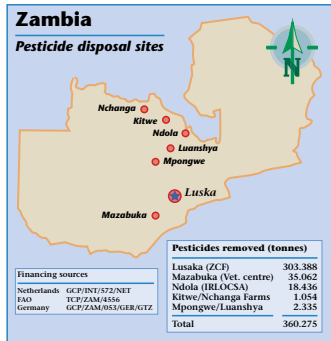




Obsolete pesticides continue to pose major environmental and health problems in developing countries



The country-free approach:

Zambia is now rid of obsolete pesticides and the government has vowed not to accumulate any again. The successful disposal operation was completed in April 1997, with the support of the Governments of the Netherlands and Germany (GTZ), FAO's Technical Cooperative Programme (TCP) and the Government of Zambia.

Pesticides kept in the open within the city centre of Lusaka with little or no security. Subject to wind, rain and erosion, emitting surface run off for several years.

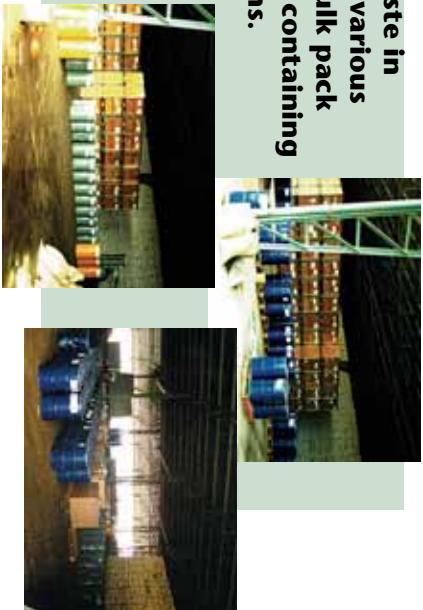

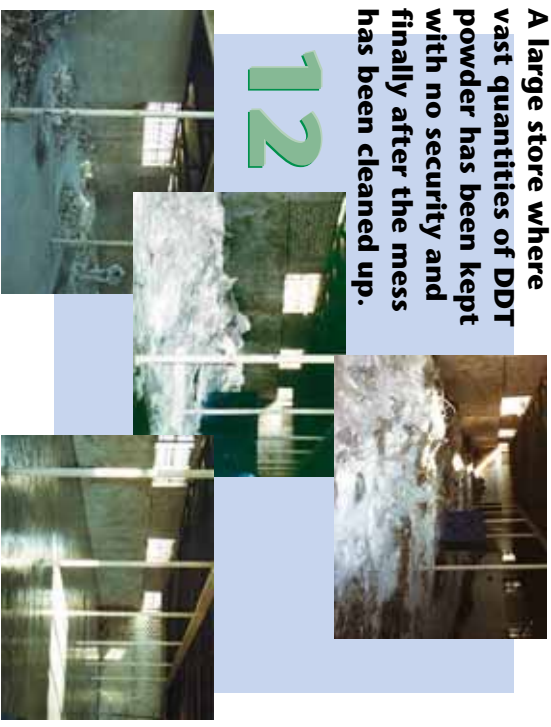
