Revision of WHO Guidelines for Drinking-Water Quality

1. In 2004, WHO issued its third edition of the Guidelines, which have been comprehensively updated to take account of developments in risk assessment and risk management. In addition to guideline values for chemicals in drinking water, the document describes a framework for drinking-water safety and discusses the roles and responsibilities of different stakeholders, including the complementary roles of national regulators, suppliers, communities and independent "surveillance" agencies. 2. The first and second editions of the WHO Guidelines for Drinking-water Quality were used by the Commission to develop the General Standard for Bottled/Packaged Drinking Waters (Other than Natural Mineral Waters) (CODEX STAN 227-2001). This Standard makes explicit reference to the WHO

Guidelines and consequently, the health-related limits for certain substances in that standard are automatically updated.

3. On the other hand, the Codex Standard for Natural Mineral Waters (CODEX STAN 108-1981, Rev. 1-1997, Amend. 2001) lists health-related limits for certain substances, substance by substance, some of which have become inconsistent with those in the WHO Guidelines. A Circular Letter is currently in preparation by the Codex Secretariat in cooperation with the host government secretariat of the Committee on Natural Mineral Waters, in order to obtain views of members on the need to revise the Codex Standard.
