

The First Edition

- Aimed to promote the compilation and use of statistics about rural areas and the incomes of agricultural households
- Prepared in 2006, major focus on Europe and OECD countries
- Published on-line and in print



What has changed since 2006?

- Improved understanding of the importance of agriculture and the need for rural development
 - World Development Report 2008
 - Impact of climate change
 - Food price crisis
- Recognition of the need to strengthen agricultural statistics
 - Global Strategy approved in 2010
- Need to expend coverage to include developing countries

Updating the Handbook

- Initially proposed to have two publications
 - Update of original
 - Supplement to discuss developing countries
- Soon agreed to have one publication, but prepared as a web-site or CD-ROM
 - Core text for all countries
 - Focus Pieces to discuss issues in more detail for developed and developing countries
 - Expended list of references and further reading (level 3) with links where possible

Managed by the Wye City Group

- Started as an inter-agency Secretariat (UNECE, FAO, OECD and Eurostat)
- Task force set up in 2003
- Handbook completed in 2006
- Wye City Group approved by UNSC in 2007
 - Aims to promote the refinement and adoption of international standards in statistics for rural areas and agriculture household incomes

 - 1. Rural Development Statistics
 - 2. Agriculture Household Income and Wealth
- Some restructuring from the first edition
- New focus pieces
- Level 3 will always be work in progress

Who is the Handbook for?

- Guide for the producers and compilers of statistics
- Provides information for analysts and the users of rural and agricultural statistics
- Aims to document and present good practice
- Can be a basis for the development of new statistical programs and activities
- Aims to be a living document

Links with the Global Strategy

- Statistics on rural areas and on agricultural incomes are central to many policy concerns
- Supports integration of data activities, concepts and definitions
- Places emphasis on the common survey framework
- Documents good practice
- Provides documentation to support the development and implementation of statistical projects and programs

- As a source of reference material for managers of statistical agencies
- To guide data users
- As a starting point for analysts and researchers
- Provides an overview, but can also support more detailed research through the focus pieces
- As a guide to technical documentation and examples of good practice in different topics
