Highlights of the week

Policy

National level

The Indian cabinet postponed a decision on a proposed Food Security Bill for 18 December 2011. The bill entitles up to 75 percent of rural population and 50 percent of urban population to receive subsidised foodgrains on a monthly basis. Although is a centrally sponsored law, it will be implemented by State governments.

In Sri Lanka, the Agriculture Ministry has drawn up a plan to develop 13 sectors of the agricultural field by allocating LKR 440 million (USD 3.8 million) to Api Wawamu Rata Nagamu, a programme that encourages domestic food production mostly through home gardening strategies.

The Thai government has prepared a comprehensive plan to provide assistance to flood -affected population. Farmers in the fisheries sub sector will receive THB 4,225 per rai (USD 135 per 0.16 ha), not exceeding 5 rai per person (0.8 ha per person). For farmers in the livestock sector, financial assistance will be provided from THB 3,600- 15,800 per animal (USD 112-505 per animal), not exceeding two animals per person. In both cases, assistance is subject to prior registration on the corresponding departments.

Viet Nam's largest rice exporter is discussing a a 300,000 MT contract to ship 5 percent broken rice to Malaysia by 2012. The deal would be worth nearly USD 150 million, based on a free-on-board (FOB) price of USD 490-\$495 per tonne on Tuesday 13 December 2011. Rice exports reached a record level 6.84 MMT as of 8 December.

Prices

Over the past week, staple food commodity prices remained relatively stable except for:

- Maize prices in Afghanistan increased by 3 percent from the previous week and were 4.5 percent above the prices recorded a month ago.
- Chicken prices in Bangladesh increased by 16 percent over the past week but were 16.5 percent below the prices observed a year ago.
- In Fiji*, corn prices fell by 14 percent, cassava prices increased by 41 percent and prices of dalo tausala increased by 72 percent.
- In Samoa**, taro prices increased by 30 percent, taro palagi prices increased by 63.5 percent, ta'amu prices fell by 6 percent and coconut prices increased by 4.2 percent
- Rice prices in Sri Lanka increased by 3 percent and were 14 percent above the prices observed 3 months ago.
- In Viet Nam, rice prices fell by 2 percent but were 2 percent above the prices observed 3 months ago.

Weather conditions

- A total of 10 provinces in Thailand remain inundated. The flood response is shifting from emergency interventions towards recovery measures as more people return to their homes (OCHA, 13 December 2011).
- In response to floods that triggered by tropical storms Haima and Nock-Ten in June and July, the Lao PDR government will allocate LAK 400 billion (USD 3.5 million) to rehabilitate agricultural production, improve public works and transport (Vientiane Times, 09 December 2011).




AFGHANISTAN, Kabul (12 December 2011 2011)

- Wheat prices are 3 and 4 percent below the prices observed a month and three months ago, respectively.

Policy+

- The University of California, Davis, has received USD 14 million from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to lead a consortium of universities to strengthen Afghanistan's agricultural extension system and stabilize its agriculture-based economy (UC Davis, 13 December 2011).
- Canada's support to WFP will assist approximately 1.2 million drought-affected people with food rations. In addition, approximately 42,000 families in urban areas will receive cash vouchers worth the equivalent value of 50 kilograms of wheat flour for a period of six months (CIDA, 13 December 2011).








CAMBODIA, Phnom Penh (12 December 2011)





- Prices of dalo tausala (taro) increased by 72 percent over the past week, and doubled from prices observed three months ago.






INDONESIA, National Average (12 December 2011)





- The government of Myanmar provided cash transfers and food assistance in kind to flood victims of Pakokku (Government of Myanmar, 13 December 2011).







- Department of Agriculture allocates PHP 253 million (USD 5.7 million) to combat banana disease (Business Mirror, 12 December 2011).



- Taro palagi prices increased by 63.5 percent from the previous month and were nearly 130 percent above the prices observed a year ago.
- Ta'amu prices fell by 6 percent during the past month but were nearly a 130 percent above the prices recorded a year ago.
- Coconut prices increased by 4.2 percent and were 4 percent above the prices observed a year ago but 16 percent below the prices registered 3 years ago.






