Highlights of the week

Policy

Regional

Under the framework of the 4th ASEAN-U.S. Leaders' Meeting ASEAN leaders noted the progress made in the Maximizing Agricultural Revenue through Knowledge, Enterprise Development and Trade (MARKET), emphasizing the enhanced trade facilitation and the improved information access by farmers and policy makers. This project was launched in March 2012, aims to improve food security for ASEAN Member States and contribute to ASEAN regional integration by facilitating free movement of food, building public/private partnerships and stimulating agriculture policy dialogue in the region (ASEAN, 20 November 2012).

National

In India, throughout the marketing year (MY) 2012-13, the area sown for Rabi (winter) crops totals 19.6 million hectares, compared to 22.3 million hectares sown during the same period for the MY 2011-12. As of 16 November, the total area sown for wheat and rice crops reached 4.9 and 0.5 million hectares, respectively (Press Information Bureau, 16 November 2012).

Prices

Over the past week, staple food commodity prices remained relatively stable in all reporting countries.

Weather conditions

During September, the Irrawaddy Delta in Myanmar was hit by floods affecting 85,000 people. The rice harvest in 2013 is expected to be significantly affected as the rains have inundated around 250,000 hectares of crops (Global Overview Update, 19 November 2012).

Heavy rains in Pakistan affected 474,000 hectares of crops and 12,000 heads of cattle. In response, the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) provided food assistance (37 kg ration packages) to over 230,000 households in the three most affected provinces: Punjab, Sindh and Balochistan (Government of Pakistan, 20 November 2012).

Technical note: Price changes are calculated from Wx, where W=week and x indicates the most recent week. The one week change is calculated as [(Wx/Wx-1)-1)]; the one month change is calculated as [(Wx/average (Wx-9,Wx-10,Wx-11,Wx-12))-1]; and the one year change is calculated as [(Wx/average (Wx-49,Wx-50,Wx-51,Wx-52)]. The criteria to flag unusual price movements is the following: on a weekly basis, nominal price variations below plus or minus 5 percent are considered "stable." On a monthly basis, nominal price variations below plus or minus 25 percent are considered "stable."


AFGHANISTAN, Kabul (19 November 2012)

Country Highlights

Staple food prices in Kabul market have been relatively stable over the past week and in comparison to those prices observed a year ago.

- Maize prices were 5 percent below those observed in the period from June to early October.


CAMBODIA, Phnom Penh (19 November 2012)

- Rice prices (Neangminh) were 14 percent above the prices observed a month earlier.




CHINA, Beijing (19 November 2012)

Policy+

By October 2012, China subsidized 283 million units of home appliances valued at CNY 681.1 billion (USD 108 billion). Since 2007, people living in rural areas are entitled to receive subsidies equal to 13 percent of the price of designated types of home appliances, including refrigerators, televisions, washing machines, computers and air conditioners (Ministry of Agriculture, 19 November 2012).




INDIA, Delhi (19 November 2012)

Country Highlights

Staple food prices in Delhi have remained relatively stable over the past week.

-Wheat prices were 27 percent higher than the levels registered a year earlier and 19 percent above the prices observed in January 2012.


LAO PDR, Vientiane (12 November 2012)

- Glutinous rice prices increased by 35 percent during the last week of October going back to Jan-June levels (LAK 7,000).


MYANMAR, Yangon and Mandalay (19 November 2012)






