Timor-Leste completes first national census of fishing boats

Timor-Leste has completed its first ever national census of fishing vessels, an achievement which will greatly facilitate the sustainable management of the nation's fisheries resources.

Between October 2011 and October 2012, a Mobile Licensing Service visited 192 fishing centers in all 11 districts throughout the country. There they gathered information on almost every fishing boat currently operative in the country.



"A total of 3,113 boats were registered during the process, of which 1,330 were issued licenses."

Information on all the boats registered and licensed has been entered into a publicly accessible online system (www.peskador.org) where it forms a national census of fishing effort.

Under Timor-Leste's fishing law certain fishing boats (those with engines) are required to obtain a license. However the process to obtain one was complex, time consuming and expensive. As a result, prior to the census only eight vessels were licensed.

In response, the NDFA, with support from RFLP, decided to form a mobile licensing team in order to make the procedure simpler, by providing a one-stop service much needed by fishers.

When the mobile teams visited the fishing centres, they helped every fisher with a boat to fill out a form detailing basic characteristics such as the owner/operator's name, vessel length, year built, type/materials, fishing techniques used etc. A registration number was then marked on every boat: spray painted for non-motorized vessels and with an acrylic plate for motorized boats. A photo of the boat and owner was also taken with a geo-referenced enabled camera, making sure that the registration number was clearly visible.

The photographs of boats/owners were then uploaded into Google Earth, so that their exact location can be recorded and seen. This information has already proven valuable in search and rescue operations for missing fishers.

Mr. Lourenco dos Reis Amaral, the Chief of the NDFA's Department of Fisheries Inspection said, "This is a major achievement for Timor-Leste. By facilitating a simpler and more effective process we now know how many fishing boats we have, where they are based and the type of fishing gear they use. This data will greatly facilitate better planning and management for the sustainable use of Timor-Leste's fisheries. At the same time by visiting communities, the mobile licensing team has also helped build better relationships between the authorities and fishers."

'Tara Bandu' laws show their teeth in Timor Leste

A Timor-Leste coastal community that worked with RFLP to formalize its traditional 'Tara Bandu' laws governing natural resources has put them to use after a protected tree was burned down.

Proving that the *Tara Bandu* is no empty threat, local authorities and the Beacou community held a traditional ceremony on 20 October 2012 to impose sanctions against five Beacou residents who had violated the *Tara Bandu* law by burning down a protected tree whilst they were drunk.

"This is the first time we have enforced *Tara Bandu* by penalizing those who damage protected natural resources. Previously we only penalized those who damaged sacred places. Since we documented the *Tara Bandu* the community has started to recognize *Tara Bandu* law in earnest," said Sergio Pedroco, chief of Beacou sub-village.

Destructive fishing gear goes up in flames in Viet Nam



A total of 52 sets of illegal Chinese box-like traps known as *lu* were burnt during a Fisheries Festival at Loc Binh Commune, Phu Loc District 21 September 2012.

Destruction of the *lu* marks a major achievement for local Fisheries Associations which have been supported by RFLP and are now regularly patrolling protected fishery areas.

The burning of these fishing gears in this kind of festival was symbolic of people's commitment to better preservation and management of lagoon resources. According to RFLP's Mr. Luong Quang Doc "There is no precedent for burning fishing gear at a Fisheries Festival. Today, the whole community and the authorities were united in their effort to reduce harmful fishing practices."

The changes will support co-management activities while also helping ensure women's participation in these processes. RFLP facilitated the work of this Committee and also provided the services of a former legal draftsman to draft the necessary amendments.

Indonesian national branding programme includes RFLP supported product

A seaweed snack developed with RFLP support in Indonesia's Nusa Tenggara Timur (NTT) province was one of the products included in the official launch of a national branding programme for fisheries products recently.

The Minister of Marine Affairs and Fisheries Mr. Sharif C. Sutardjo launched the 'national branding programme for fisheries products' at the Indonesia Fisheries Expo (IFE) 2012, held in Jakarta in October.

Amongst the products selected was the seaweed pillus (a crunchy seaweed snack) made by NTT's 'Mama Fons' who has worked closely with RFLP to develop her product. This will be sold under a new brand named 'Freeze and Fresh' and is set to join other leading products from around Indonesia on the shelves of national supermarket chains Alfamart and Alfamidi.

First fish auction sessions piloted in Thua Thien Hue province

In November, five pilot auctions were held at Thuan An Fishing Port, Thua Thien Hue province following support from RFLP. This marks the first time such an initiative has been conducted in coastal central Viet Nam.

The auctions are expected to enhance transparency in fish trading by reflecting real costs and prices along the supply chain and helping diversify how fishers can sell their catches in addition to the current channels.

Mr. Tran Van Tho, one of the small traders at the fishing port, said about the trial auction, "This is very new so to be honest, we were a bit confused at first. However, during the sessions, we gradually saw a lot of potential benefits from this model."

A coconut oil production facility operated by the fishing community of Sinnapaduwa in Sri Lanka's Puttalam district opened in November. Comprising 11 women and three men, Shwashakthi Coconut Oil Producing Enterprise was formed as part of RFLP's micro-enterprise development programme. Drawing on the vast supply of coconuts in the area the micro-enterprise helps diversify the livelihoods of this community which previously depended solely on fishing.

One of the group members, Mrs Patima Chandane expressed her satisfaction, "Formerly I worked doing small sewing jobs. I am very happy now and have had a lot of training. I will use any income I make to complete the construction of my house."


Programme Steering Committee


