

Considerations when developing forest policy

- Forests are multifunctional
 Policies that support healthy and more forests will be more effective than single issue policies
- Many forest benefits are received by others in society, not the owner
 - Encouragement to maintain healthy forests and invest in new forests is likely to achieve more than penalties for not doing this

Considerations when developing forest policy (ctd)

- Forests are long lived
 Significant shifts in forest policy between establishment and maturity can significantly affect the economics of the investment
- Politicians and others easily seduced by <u>apparently</u> higher returns from forest land if used for another purpose
 - Need constant vigilance, education and comprehensive accounting for all the costs and externalities




Forest Policy Requirements
