CONCEPT NOTE

Introduction

In an intertwined and globalized world knowledge and solutions are spread across a vast array of institutions and organizations. FAO recognizes that partnerships are a crucial enabler for assisting Member States in their efforts to eradicate hunger, malnutrition and food insecurity. Through its Reviewed Strategic Framework, a set of Strategic Objectives ¹ have been identified representing the main areas of work on which FAO will concentrate its efforts to achieve its vision and global goals. Strengthening alliances with diverse partners, including the academia, civil society organizations, private sector and farmer organisations and cooperative is an essential factor in enabling the success of this new approach.

The role of academia as a source of cutting-edge research, data resources and skill development for current and future needs is well recognised. Institutions of higher education generate knowledge for evidence-based decision making and create an environment to nurture innovation and critical thinking. There is a recognition both amongst the academia and the development community that academia could play a more direct role as partners in the global fight against poverty and hunger. Knowledge and effective access to it at all levels, is central to eradicating hunger, achieving sustainable food systems, equity, rural prosperity and resilience.

From Knowledge to Action

Over the years, FAO has engaged with many universities and research institutions for scientific, social and economic research inputs, largely in an *ad hoc* manner. The current Strategic Framework provides opportunity to identify, engage and promote sustainable partnerships at an institutional level, that capitalize on the comparative advantages and increases value-propositions for mutually beneficial alignments to addresses the global and local challenges. By leveraging mutual partnerships, FAO can assist Member States to stay ahead on knowledge advancements, provide relevant policy advice and technical expertise in a world of rapidly evolving technologies and innovations.

The main objective of the expert consultation is to reinforce partnerships and identify ways and means to strengthen FAO-Academia partnerships to support the delivery of the Strategic Objectives. The consultation will provide an opportunity to review the FAO Academia partnership Strategy and chart a road map to address the knowledge needs of the Strategic Objectives through value-added collaborations. It will catalyse dialogue to promote effective, efficient, transformational partnerships at the global, regional and national levels.
