Objective:	To strengthen food security and analysis in Mozambique through standardized food security classification analysis.
Key partners:	The Ministry of Agriculture and Food Security (MASA).
Beneficiaries reached:	Representatives of the <i>Secretariado Técnico de Segurança Alimentar e Nutricional</i> (SETSAN), the Government, partner agencies, Non-governmental Organizations (NGOs), resource partners and other stakeholders.
Activities implemented:	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Organized seven Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC) TWG meetings with stakeholders and NGOs to discuss and finalize IPC plans for Mozambique to ensure results are used for timely response• Procured 20 android devices for SETSAN.• Conducted four trainings for SETSAN enumerators prior to data collection to ensure quality control.• Recruited national and international IPC consultants.• Conducted Level 1 trainings in IPC acute food insecurity (AFI) and acute malnutrition (AMN), with a total of 40 participants.• Conducted two IPC AFI analyses (June and update in November 2017) and one IPC AMN (May 2017).• Produced two IPC reports, integrating the results from the AFI and AMN analyses.• Trained eight participants from SETSAN and MASA on Statistical Package for the Social Sciences.• Trained 33 participants from government and partner agencies on the IPC Chronic Food Insecurity (CFI) classification. The analysis was also conducted for 22 livelihood zones in ten provinces.• Produced and shared with stakeholders a report on the project's lessons learned to inform future programming and a report on the institutionalization of the IPC.• Conducted training, in collaboration with the IPC Global Support Unit, on how to package and communicate effectively the results of the IPC CFI to the IPC secretariat.• Shared the IPC reports with all stakeholders, including the Food Security Cluster and at the Southern African Development Community annual dissemination meeting.• Shared the preliminary results of the IPC CFI analysis at a meeting held with all partners (representatives of NGOs, ministries, resource partners and partner agencies) in Maputo.
Results:	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Leveraged the IPC partnership and contributed to strengthening the capacity of the IPC TWG analysts to ensure food security and nutrition analysis is institutionalized in the country.• Increased the number of IPC Level 1 and 2 trained practitioners.• Enhanced coordination and improved the response to the impact of El Niño on Mozambique's food security and nutrition situation.
