

# **Guidelines for the Preparation of Voluntary National Reports to the Third Session of the United Nations Forum on Forests, Including a Suggested Report Format<sup>1</sup>**

## **1. Introduction**

This document, prepared by the Secretariat of the United Nations Forum on Forests (UNFF), is intended to provide guidance to States Members of the UN on the preparation of their national reports for the third session of the UNFF, to be held in Geneva from 26 May to 6 June 2003. This was done in response to the decision of UNFF, at its second session, which,

*“requests its secretariat, in order to assist countries in preparing their voluntary reports, to develop a suggested format to serve as a basis for countries to use and report on their implementation of the relevant IPF/IFF proposals for action at its third session.” (E/2002/42, Decision 2/1)*

## **2. Background on national reporting to UNFF**

When Economic and Social Council established UNFF in October 2000, it identified monitoring, assessment and reporting on progress as one of the principle functions of UNFF (document E/2000/35, paragraph 2e).

At its first session in June 2001, (E/2001/42/Rev.1), UNFF adopted several resolutions<sup>2</sup> that provided guidance on country reporting. The principles, reflected in the various related resolutions, are brought together in Resolution 1/2, Annex paragraph 23, which reads as follows:

*“Voluntary reporting by countries, regions, organizations and processes on their implementation of the IPF/IFF proposals for action should include achievements and identify gaps and obstacles to implementation, inter alia, on means of implementation. The reports may be prepared in consultation with relevant stakeholders. Such voluntary reports would start at the second session of UNFF.”*

Although countries agreed at the first session of UNFF to report to the second session, no decision was adopted regarding the preparation of guidelines or a format for national reports. Consequently, the national reports submitted varied in content, structure and length.

Subsequently, UNFF, at its second session, requested the UNFF Secretariat to develop a suggested reporting format to facilitate national reporting at the third session. The suggested format is presented in Appendix 1 below.

## **3. Purpose and use of the national reports**

The primary purpose of the national reports is to provide a useful planning tool for countries. The reporting process is intended to help countries assess their progress in implementing relevant IPF/IFF proposals for action, analyze lessons learned, and identify gaps and obstacles that the country might wish

to address. The process of preparing the reports can catalyze enhanced cooperation and coordination on forests among government agencies and other stakeholders in the country.

The reports will be made available to the focal agencies of the Collaborative Partnership on Forests (CPF) preparing Secretary-General's reports for the third session of UNFF. The national reports and corresponding Secretary-General's reports will provide an overview of countries' achievements, identify commonly experienced obstacles to implementation and approaches to overcome them, and help countries identify key issues for discussion in UNFF and subsequent international action.

#### **4. Contribution of the national reports to the review of the effectiveness of the international arrangement on forests**

The national reports will play the following two fundamental roles in the review of the effectiveness of the international arrangement on forests, which will be carried out in 2005 on the basis of the criteria adopted at the second session of UNFF<sup>3</sup>:

- The reports will provide information for the assessment of countries' progress in implementing the relevant IPF/IFF proposals for action [*criterion a(i)*] as well as of the extent to which partnerships relevant to implementation have been advanced [*criterion c(i)*].
- Among the criteria for the review of the effectiveness are ones related to the reporting process itself, including the extent to which: countries respond to the call to submit voluntary reports [*criterion e(i)*]; trends; trends, lessons learned and emerging issues are identified by the reports [*criterion e(ii)*]; and participation of major groups<sup>4</sup> in developing voluntary reports was encouraged [*criterion e(iii)*].

#### **5. Preparation of the report**

UNFF's recognition of the importance of enhancing stakeholder participation in the preparation of national reports to UNFF is reflected in both Resolution 1/2, Annex paragraph 23 (see above) and *criterion e(iii)* for the review of the effectiveness of the international arrangement on forests. Accordingly, countries are encouraged to involve a range of relevant government agencies and major groups in the preparation of their voluntary national reports, and to provide related information in the reports.

#### **6. Approach, content and format of the report**

##### **Approach**

In developing the reporting format, the UNFF Secretariat took into consideration the experiences of countries in reporting to the Commission on Sustainable Development (CSD). Specifically, it considered the findings and recommendations of the meeting of the national focal points on improving future national reporting to the CSD, held in New York, on 12-13 February 2002<sup>5</sup>. Among other things, the

meeting called for guidelines that are flexible, to allow countries to express specific national interests and concerns but within a standardized format; are simple and streamlined (i.e., with fewer, but more clustered questions); include national impact analysis rather than just accomplishments alone; and ask for forward looking views on various actions needed to be undertaken at various levels.

## **Content**

The suggested format for the report is provided in Appendix 1. Countries are invited to provide information on the following: I) key contacts in the forest sector in the country; II) progress and issues related to implementation of IPF/IFF proposals for action; and III) preparation of the report.

The first point in Part II addresses general information on progress in evaluating (or assessing) the IPF/IFF proposals for action in the national context, progress in the national forest programme or similar national policy framework for forests, and stakeholder participation. Many countries have already reported on these activities in Chapter 11 (combating deforestation) of their “Country Profile” (on national implementation of Agenda 21), which were submitted to the CSD for the World Summit on Sustainable Development (Johannesburg, South Africa, 26 August-4 September 2002).<sup>6</sup> Sensitive to the need to reduce reporting burden and streamline reporting requirements, the UNFF Secretariat suggests that countries simply update this information, where applicable. A copy of the CD Rom containing all Country Profiles is included within, along with a hard copy of the country’s report on forests, if submitted.

The other points in Part II focus on progress in implementing IPF/IFF proposals for action related to the three substantive issues (or “elements”) to be addressed at the third session of UNFF: i) economic aspects of forests; ii) forest health and productivity; and iii) maintaining forest cover to meet present and future needs. Countries are invited to provide information on their recent (i.e. since IPF was established in 1995) experiences in implementing related proposals for action, as input for discussions under agenda items 3 and 4 of the third session of UNFF (see Appendix 2). Countries are also invited to provide information on “means of implementation” (i.e. finance, transfer of environmentally sound technologies and capacity-building for sustainable forest management) and some of the “common items” of UNFF in the context of the three substantive issues.

If a country does not have information on a certain point or that point is not relevant in the national context, the report may simply state “no information available” or “not applicable”, respectively. If the information is available in another report or document, the country may choose to extract the relevant information and include it in the national report to UNFF or provide the reference or document itself, with an indication of the relevant section, to the UNFF Secretariat.

## **Length, language and format**

The length of the reports will vary from country to country. Countries are encouraged to be as concise as possible, however, with a view to providing a report of a total length of 10-20 pages.

As has been done in CSD reporting, and in light of time constraints and financial limitations, countries are kindly asked to provide their reports in English, Spanish or French. It is hoped that the other official languages of the UN may be accommodated in the future.

Countries are kindly requested to submit their national report in electronic form (in MS Word format), if possible, and are asked to specify the software used if it is other than Microsoft 2000. Consistent formatting of all reports would facilitate their use, thus the following specifications are suggested: font in Times New Roman, size 11; margins of 1" or 2.5 cm on the sides, top and bottom; and simple text without tabs or line breaks.

## **7. Submission of the national reports**

The UNFF Secretariat requests that the national report be submitted by 22 December 2002, preferably in electronic form (by e-mail or by sending a diskette) as well as in hard copy. The report may be submitted to:

### **Economic aspects of forests, including trade**

2. Please provide information on: i) activities undertaken in your country, ii) progress made, iii) lessons learned, iv) constraints encountered (including those related to financing, transfer of environmentally sound technologies, and needs for capacity-building) and v) initiatives planned and vi) the role of enhanced cooperation and policy and programme coordination to facilitate progress in:
  - valuation of forest goods and services (this may include, among other things, the development and use of new valuation methodologies, valuation of a wider range of goods and services, and policy decisions that reflect a more comprehensive assessment of forest values)
  - the amount, scope, or quality of market data and information for wood and non-wood forest products and their substitutes
  - use of economic and policy instruments to facilitate progress toward sustainable forest management (these may include improved tax policies and forest revenue collection systems)
3. Please provide information on i) initiatives taken, ii) progress made, iii) lessons learned, iv) constraints encountered (including those related to financing, transfer of environmentally sound technologies, and needs for capacity-building) and v) initiatives planned, and vi) the role of enhanced cooperation and policy and programme coordination to facilitate progress related to trade in forest products or environmental services (e.g. carbon trading), including in:
  - efforts to reduce negative impacts of trade,
  - participation in forest certification and labeling schemes and work toward mutual recognition and comparability of such schemes, and
  - efforts to reduce illegal trade (exports from or imports into your country) in wood or non-wood forest products. Please indicate achievements made, lessons learned, constraints encountered, and planned initiatives.

## **Forest health and productivity**

4. If damage to forests from air pollution is a significant problem in your country, please provide information on recent national strategies or programmes to minimize damaging air pollution. Please indicate if your country is involved in any international cooperation efforts aimed at strengthening scientific knowledge, increasing information access or reducing the impacts of long-range air pollution on forests, as well as your views on the role of enhanced cooperation at the regional and international levels to facilitate such work.

## **Maintaining forest cover to meet present and future needs**

5. Please indicate progress made and lessons learned in efforts to harmonize or to make compatible policy frameworks in your country (e.g. national forest programme or a similar policy framework for forests, biodiversity strategies and action plans, national action plans to combat desertification, etc.) that collectively address the full range of forest values.

6. Please provide information on recent efforts to assess long-term trends in national supply and demand for wood, non-wood forest products and services and whether your country's national forest programme or similar policy framework for forests takes into consideration future needs for forest goods and services. Please provide views on how enhanced cooperation at the regional and international levels, including through UNFF, could further facilitate implementation of the IPF/IFF proposals for action

## **Other information and emerging issues**

7. Please provide any additional relevant information on the implementation of proposals for action or emerging issues<sup>8</sup> related to: i) economic aspects of forests, ii) forest health and productivity, or iii) maintaining forest cover to meet present and future needs.

## **III. Preparation of the Report**

**Provisional Agenda for the Third Session of UNFF**

  - (b) Means of implementation (finance, transfer of environmentally sound technologies and capacity-building for sustainable forest management) as a cross-cutting issue, considered in the context of items 3(a) (i)(ii) and (iii);
4. Common items for each session:
  - (a) Multi-stakeholder dialogue;
  - (b) Enhanced cooperation and policy and programme coordination;
  - (c) Country experience and lessons;
  - (d) Emerging issues relevant to country implementation;
  - (e) Intersessional work, including further discussion on the ad hoc expert groups;
  - (f) Monitoring, assessment and reporting;
  - (g) Promoting public participation;
  - (h) National forest programmes;
  - (i) Trade;
  - (j) Enabling environment.

6. Provisional agenda for the fourth session of the Forum.
  7. Adoption of the report of the Forum on its third session.
