BANGKOK COMMUNIQUÉ

Bangkok, 15th May 2015

We, the representatives of 18 countries from Asia participating at the Asian Soil partnership Consultative workshop held in Bangkok, Thailand on 13-15 May 2015, funded by FAO and jointly organized with the Land Development Department of Thailand, and in accordance to the Terms of Reference of the Global Soil partnership, would like to:

- Appreciate the great diversity of soils in the region and their fundamental value for food security and overall sustainable development.
- Call the attention that soil degradation is a serious process that is affecting the soils in the region through their various forms such as soil erosion, soil pollution, soil organic matter depletion, soil sealing and soil salinity.
- Report that the degradation process is threatening the soil resources in the Asian region and thus is affecting food production and associated food security, provision of ecosystem services, adaptation to climate change and increasing poverty. The situation is being aggravated by climate change and unsustainable soil management practices.
- Inform that the establishment of the Asian Soil Partnership is a unique opportunity for addressing the current challenges and serve as platform for promoting sustainable soil management in the region.
- Advocating for the following priorities in the region: promotion of sustainable soil management at all levels and in all land use types; restoration/rehabilitation of degraded soils with focus on soil erosion, nutrient imbalance, soil acidification, soil pollution, loss of organic carbon and soil salinity. Similarly, the enhancement of soil information by using state of the art methods of digital soil mapping and advocating for having national soil information systems.
- Call the attention that investment on the promotion of sustainable soil management is a pre-condition for achieving sustainable development. Therefore, it is fundamental to increase the investment to support the execution of actions under the priorities highlighted before.

To achieve these goals, the participants agreed to consolidate the Asian Soil Partnership by establishing the Secretariat hosted by Thailand and a Steering Committee that is composed by:
