

Selection and Appointment of the Secretary of the Governing Body

Executive Summary

This document relates to the selection and appointment of the Secretary of the Governing Body following the selection process and the selection of a candidate by the by the Director-General FAO.

Guidance Sought

The Governing Body is invited to approve the candidate selected by the Director-General for the position of the Secretary of the Governing Body.



I. Introduction and Background

1. Under Article 20.1 of the Treaty, the Secretary of the Treaty is appointed by the Director-General with the approval of the Governing Body.

- 2. At its 155th Session in December 2016, the Council of FAO considered the issue of the appointment of Secretaries of Article XIV Bodies and "noted that under decisions of the Conference and provisions of treaties establishing Bodies under Article XIV of the FAO Constitution the Secretaries were appointed by the Director-General with the approval of the bodies concerned". The Council acknowledged the need to balance the functional autonomy of Article XIV Bodies with the responsibilities borne by the Organization for such Bodies. The Council stressed the urgency of filling the vacant position of Secretary of the Treaty and agreed, on an exceptional basis, on a process, based on FAO's standard procedures for the appointment of senior staff, for the selection of the Secretary of the Treaty, with the inclusion of two representatives of Members of the Treaty in the Interview Panel.
- 3. In accordance with the procedure established by the Council, a vacancy announcement was issued for a period of 45 days from 12 December 2016 until 26 January 2017, for the position of Secretary of the Treaty. Applications were received and reviewed on the basis of the requirements and competencies set out in the vacancy announcement. An Interview Panel was established, comprising Messrs. René Castro-Salazar, Assistant Director-General, Climate, Biodiversity, Land and Water Department (acting as Chairperson of the Panel), Ren Wang, Assistant Director-General, Agriculture and Consumer Protection Department, and Basharat Ali, Special Adviser, Human Resources Division. In line with the Council decision, Mr Muhamad Sabran, Chairperson of the Governing Body of the Treaty, and Ms Svanhild-Isabelle Batta Torheim, member of the Bureau of the Treaty, participated in the Interview Panel as representatives of the Parties to the Treaty. The Panel interviewed 12 candidates and, subsequently, it submitted a Report to the Director-General, recommending a short list of candidates for consideration for the post.
- 4. Following consideration of the Report, the Director-General decided to select Mr. Kent Nnadozie (a national of Nigeria) for the position. By letter of 22 June 2017, the Director-General informed Mr Muhamad Sabran, Chairperson of the Governing Body of the Treaty of the proposed appointment of Mr. Nnadozie. The curriculum vitae of Mr Kent Nnadozie is attached hereto.
- 5. In accordance with the decision taken by the Council of FAO at its 155th Session, the appointment is for two years subject to confirmation by the Governing Body of the Treaty.

II. GUIDANCE SOUGHT

6. The Governing Body is invited to approve the proposed appointment of Mr Kent Nnadozie as the Secretary of the Treaty.
