





Stop ASF: Public and Private partnering for success

21 and 28 June 2021

Concept note

African swine fever (ASF) continues to spread across the globe. Recognising the global threat and the impact posed by this disease, and in response to the request by its Members at the 87th OIE General Session (2019) as defined in Resolution No. 33., the Global Framework for the Progressive Control of Transboundary Animal Diseases (GF-TADs) Global Initiative for the Control of African Swine Fever (ASF) was launched jointly by the FAO and OIE on 20 July 2020.

In order to promote and make a global call for action to adopt and implement the GF-TADs Initiative for the Global Control of ASF, a joint FAO and OIE GF-TADs series of webinars on African swine fever titled “An unprecedented global threat - A challenge to livelihoods, food security and biodiversity. Call for action” were held on 26-30 October 2020. The event brought together specialists from national Veterinary Services, industry, research, academia, and regional and international partners to review existing and recently developed tools, mechanisms and practices to address the introduction and spread of ASF.

In continuation of these activities to promote the Global Initiative and in linking with the call for action event, the FAO and OIE is to organize a virtual event on Public Private Partnership (PPP). ‘**Stop ASF: Public and Private partnering for success**’ to highlight the importance and role of PPP and promote the engagement of the public and private sectors in the Global Initiative.

It is expected that this global virtual event will then be followed by regional workshops to turn ideas into actionable plans and/or follow-up preliminary steps taken by countries or groups of countries to implement PPP towards better control or prevent ASF.

OBJECTIVES

- Understand the impact of ASF in the public and private sectors
- Identify the needs and common grounds of interest of all stakeholders for the effective control of ASF
- Showcase how PPP can help prevent and/or control ASF with proven efficiency and impact. This could be based on 3-4 well-selected field examples, for ASF preferably or other swine diseases.
- Identify partnership opportunities and current and future win-win scenarios
- Promote the engagement of stakeholders and facilitate PPP collaboration in the implementation of the ASF Global Initiative

TARGET AUDIENCE

- Private sector: Representatives from the swine supply chain including producers, producer associations, industry or trade organisations, meat, feed and pharmaceutical industry, private veterinarians or veterinary paraprofessionals, swine sector consultants, hunter associations, etc
- Public sector: National Veterinary Services including decision makers (CVO), livestock production sector and technical staff managing the national ASF control programmes, local government/authorities, environment agencies, agricultural development services,

- Catalyst group: Advocates for PPP including law enforcement, academia, research networks, communication experts, regional economic communities, investors, insurance sector, transport authorities (i.e. International Air Transport Association, International Maritime Organization), world customs association and civil society representatives, including NGOs

THE EVENT

The virtual global event will have two live session event (1.5 hour/day) on 21 and 28 June 2021. A suitable time will be selected to allow wide participation of the audiences and to maximise participation. It is planned to use a collaborative platform website to address the time difference and favour asynchronized discussion by chat.

Prior to the webinar, the invited participants will be provided with information regarding the training materials and courses that the OIE/FAO-EuFMD have developed. Participants can prepare themselves before the meeting.

The event will have two sessions:

Session 1: PPP concept, stakeholder mapping and need assessment. Pre-recorded videos, live presentations followed by a short Q&A session (21 June 2021). This session will include:

- A background and introduction to PPP concept applied to disease control
- A background on typologies of PPPs applied to veterinary domain
- A background on enabling environment for PPP (e.g. whether there is a suitable regulatory framework in place to establish a PPP)
- Role of catalyst organizations including international organizations under GF-TADs
- Initiate the stakeholder mapping exercise (i.e. identifying key players and their subsets who incur the burden of the disease and also are crucial in controlling ASF)
- Presenting success stories of PPP that have delivered benefits and impact in the control of ASF
- Presenting needs/expectations from other partners by at least two key stakeholders

By the end this session participants should have a deep understanding on the ppp principles and identify main stakeholders and their expectations. It should be a general agreement on the interest and potential benefits in exploring and engaging into PPP for successful and sustainable ASF control.

Session 2: Identifying of key stakeholders and opportunities for successful PPP.

Facilitated panel discussion, including audience participation (28 June 2021). This session will include

- Discuss potential PPP opportunities in the prevention, early detection and response along the value chain (eg. biosecurity, surveillance, diagnosis, compensation scheme, awareness campaigns, etc.)
- Build on lessons learned on swine disease control
- Discuss challenges and enabling environment for successful PPP
- List key stakeholders
- Propose way forwards to explore PPP at regional and country level

Translation in French and Spanish will be available for the live session.

EXPECTED OUTPUTS

- Gathering and sharing of PPP experiences, their impact and lessons learned on swine disease control
- List opportunities/priority areas for PPP to support and improve ASF control at global and regional level in line with the Global Initiative
- List of relevant parties to advocate for peer participation and way forward, including who champions the organisation of regional workshops


