



## **International Conference Halting Deforestation and Increasing Forest Area – from Aspiration to Action**

### **Youth Uniting Sectors to Halt Deforestation**

**Monday, February 19, 9:00-5:30, FAO HQ – Iran Room & Ethiopia Room**

### **Concept:**

Youth and young people are integral to the scaling up of promising landscape level restoration efforts and successful outreach and transmission of these methods to the local level. As most pressing landscape challenges of today are intergenerational, we are offering a 1-day youth session for students across sectors – forestry (IFSA), agriculture (YPARD, IAAS, CSAYN), and biodiversity (GYBN). Designed by youth for youth, this session seeks to bridge the wide gap between global agendas the realities of young people. Session participants will develop their knowledge and skills, amplify the messages of the deforestation conference through creation of an online course, and contribute to drafting a work plan for youth contributions to the UN Strategic Plan for Forests for 2017-2030 (UNSPF).

The session provides training on three integral components of combating deforestation; the landscape approach, effective communication, and the role of gender in natural resource management, through workshops facilitated by experts. Further, the session will provide a practical exercise on “scaling out” by giving youth delegates the opportunity to curate educational content around the conference themes and key messages. A 2-hour consultation and planning meeting will feed participant knowledge into the Major Group Children and Youth (MGCY) work plan to the UNSPF. This consultation aims to produce concrete, thought out implementation strategies to be expanded on, and finalized through presentation to the member states of the UN Forum on Forests in May 2018.

In all, the session will build capacity and demonstrate the power of individual and collective action, with the ultimate goal of empowering young people to act and accelerate progress towards the 2030 Agenda.

### **Session objectives:**



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- **Train participants** on needed skills to solve today’s environmental challenges.
  - How to ‘think and act landscape’, communicate effectively, and consider gender and stakeholder consultation in project design.
- Clearly communicate **complicated global agendas** and their relevance to youth.
- Map out concrete activities and projects for **youth action** towards a better planet.
  - Operationalize the UNFF MGCY 2018-2022 Work Plan to the UNSPF
- Expand and deepen a cross-sectoral **community of practice** within the ‘Youth in Landscapes’ Initiative.
- Engage a broader audience by producing content for a 5-day online [“short course” on halting deforestation](#) from the conference key messages.
