#### Notes

- Package price includes:** inputs, transportation costs, quality control, implementing partner services, third party monitoring and FAO services. Cash for work and unconditional cash transfers prices also include fees paid to financial service providers. All prices are as of August 2021.
- Benefits for households figures** are derived from the post-harvest and outcome monitoring surveys coordinated by FAO in project areas. These surveys are conducted by an independent third-party monitoring service provider. All data collection is done using KoBo Toolbox with a representative sample size of household-level respondents, which are randomly drawn from the total direct beneficiaries by using a 5 percent margin of error with a "z" score of 1.96 (normal probability distribution) and an "s" score of 0.5 (standard deviation).

- These **quantitative surveys** are done for all emergency response projects for all emergency assistance package types and are complemented by anecdotal data collection by FAO National and Regional Offices and the Monitoring, Evaluation and Learning team.
- All beneficiaries are sensitized on **COVID-19 safety procedures**, based on the guidelines developed by FAO to be adopted at farm-gate, markets, transhumance, public spaces, cash for work sites and inputs/cash distribution sites.
