The SVC4SIDS project is working closely with stakeholders to develop sustainable fishery value chains and to identify inefficiencies and opportunities pertaining to social, economic and environmental dimensions through a multilevel, highly participatory strategy in selected countries.

Our objectives

The project aims to strengthen the value chains of high-value species in SIDS, leading to greater social and economic benefits while ensuring sustainable production and trade in fish and fish products.

Enhance the economic performance of micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs)




Safeguard the marine environment through sustainable fisheries management and climate change adaptation






Our work

Cabo verde

Tuna and black mackerel have long been a cornerstone of the country's fisheries. Their value chains contribute immensely to the socioeconomic well-being of Cabo Verdeans.



Kiribati

Fisheries are of fundamental importance for the economy and food security of Kiribati. The tuna value chain focuses on the domestic market, while the lobster value chain is focused on exports.

The tuna fishery in Barbados harvests a large percentage of high-grade tuna. The enhanced value chain will increase the benefits from the tuna trade.
