CONCEPT NOTE

Rural communities, smallholders and family farmers in Eastern Europe and Central Asia usually face many development constraints and problems, which are complex and inter-related in their nature. In order to accelerate the development of rural areas, contribute to rural transformation and poverty reduction and not to leave anybody behind, an integrated and cross-sectoral approach is often needed. The Agenda 2030 and achieving the Sustainable Development Goals also require a more integrated and cross-sectoral approach to development, addressing several problems at the same time in a coordinated and coherent way.

In Europe and Central Asia for more than a decade FAO has supported or is currently working on different initiatives and projects related to local rural development/integrated community development in Albania, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Moldova, North Macedonia and Serbia.

Based on country experiences, FAO Regional Office for Europe and Central Asia (REU) aims at further developing the concept of integrated community development for the region. As part of the FAO REU Regional Initiative on empowering smallholders, family farms and youth through inclusive rural transformation, digitalization and innovation, in 2019 FAO REU organized the 1st Regional Workshop on integrated community development during which established an informal regional technical network on community development. To support the development of the network and strengthen partnerships with key regional and national stakeholders FAO REU will organize the 3rd Regional Workshop in 2023.

Participants are expected to be from Governments, civil society, academia, private sector and international organizations with an interest in and working with local rural development and community development.

The workshop will be held on **6-8 June 2023 in Budapest**. On the first day a **field visit** near Budapest will be organized where good practices on rural development will be showcased and discussed. The following **two days of sessions and discussions** will cover the below-mentioned topics:

- Discuss country needs and support provided at policy level for local rural development;
- Present the main results of the ongoing FAO study on *Integrated community development and other territorial approaches in Europe and Central Asia*, and discuss its recommendations;
- Present and discuss different approaches, practical experiences and lessons learnt in local rural development;
- Discuss policy options for supporting the development of rural communities in the region with special focus on rural youth;
- Raise awareness on resilience of family farming and the situation of rural youth;
- Showcase country experiences on local rural development, including EU LEADER approach for non-EU countries;
- Continue the development of the technical network on community development and contribute to the establishment of new partnerships between governments, international organizations, donors, civil society, academia and private sector with interest in local rural development.

We are looking forward to welcoming all partners in Budapest.

FIELD TRIP
