

Reduce the need for antimicrobials in agrifood systems

When developed over time, a biosecurity plan will help you prioritize and manage your biosecurity risks. This pig biosecurity checklist represents the best practices for protecting your pigs from the introduction and spread of pests and diseases. To develop your pig biosecurity plan in stages, tick Y for the practices you currently do, N for those you don't, NR for those irrelevant to your farm and P for those currently high priority to address. Choose 1-3 priority actions at a time to focus on. Draw a basic farm map below, noting the key entry and exit points, clean and dirty zones, pig housing structures and any demarcated waste sites.
