Adjustments to the Programme of Work and Budget



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INTRODUCTION

1. This document is submitted to the Programme and Finance Committees in accordance with operative paragraph 2 of Conference Resolution 7/2003 on *Budgetary Appropriations 2004-05* (the full text of which is reproduced in Annex I).

2. The approved level of US\$ 749.1 million in the Appropriations Resolution reflects only in part the exchange rate adjustment (at the budget rate of $\notin 1 = US$ \$ 1.19 set by the Conference) and the provision for anticipated cost increases, which would have been necessary to reach a Zero-Real Growth (ZRG) budget level of US\$ 800.3 million. It may be recalled that this approved level of US\$ 749.1 million was the result of a compromise, after protracted negotiations among Members during the Conference. The US\$ 51.2 million difference to the ZRG level was simply pro-rated across the various budgetary chapters, leading to the macro-level figures in the Resolution. Hence, it was necessary to identify, after due analysis of underlying priorities, net resource reductions totalling US\$ 51.2 million from the ZRG scenario presented in the Programme of Work and Budget (PWB) 2004-05 (in percentage terms: 6.4%).

- 3. Accordingly, the scope of this document is to:
 - outline the policy approach, and the measures taken, to identify the required reductions;
 - present revised budget allocations by main programme headings;
 - explain the impact in terms of substantive activities as well as support services, set against the ZRG proposals in the PWB document; and
 - present related staffing changes.

4. For the sake of economy and to avoid unnecessary repetitions, the baseline information contained in the PWB document has been used in the present document to the extent that it was deemed pertinent to facilitate the task of the Committees (e.g. major resource tables and output lists). Material which was not considered essential to the explanation of the budgetary reduction, has been excluded. Examples include the section on regional dimensions and the tentative plans relating to the Priority Areas For Interdisciplinary Action (PAIAs) and the Strategies to Address Cross-Organizational Issues (SACOIs) in the PWB, which remain valid in broad terms, although resource constraints will unavoidably affect capacities to support them. Attention is drawn to the additional information available on FAO's website at www.fao.org/pwb/, including the distribution of resources by region.

APPROACH

- 5. Managerial action leading to the present proposals included the following:
 - Initiation of implementation of activities was based on "conservative" provisional allotments issued to all units, together with measures to slow down the filling of vacant posts. Firmer parameters to govern implementation of revised work programmes will be issued once the proposed distribution of resources has been considered by the Committees.
 - Policy guidance was provided to all Assistant Directors-General (ADGs) and other office heads in terms of indicative overall "reduction targets" from provisions in the ZRG scenario. In line with paragraph 2 of the Appropriations Resolution, these targets already took account of priorities as expressed in Governing Bodies, albeit in a broad manner. These targets foresaw a few selected areas to be accorded absolute protection, including instances of commitment to third parties, while other areas were tentatively assigned to "high" and "medium" protection

categories. Latitude was offered to the concerned ADGs and office heads to modulate the impact of these aggregate reduction targets at the level of programme entities and outputs, also bearing in mind the results of the application of criteria for priority setting for substantive work, as established by the Council at its 110th Session (cf. subsequent explanations).

- Regional and Subregional Offices were actively involved in commenting on the proposals of departments at Headquarters (HQ) about specific priority concerns in respective regions.
- A renewed call was made to all units for the vigorous identification of further efficiency gains. A number of resource reductions reflected in the present document can be attributed to this effort. Additional ideas are still being pursued, but have not yet reached the stage of proven feasibility to allow for potential savings to be taken into account (cf. subsequent section on *Efficiency Savings*).
- Submissions from all units in response to the above guidance were centrally analyzed and major problems brought to the attention of Senior Management for arbitration and final decision.
- The whole exercise benefited from the system support available in FAO's Programme Planning, Implementation Reporting and Evaluation System (PIRES). The starting point for submissions was the detailed information of the ZRG scenario, stored in that system. However, it may be noted that some adjustments to the "base" were necessary prior to units formulating revised proposals for 2004-05. These adjustments are reflected in the tabular material throughout the document whenever referring to ZRG provisions (cf. additional explanations below).
- Consultations were ensured as required with staff representative bodies on the impact of proposals on staffing levels and current incumbents.

MEMBERS' PRIORITIES AND THE APPLICATION OF CRITERIA FOR PRIORITY SETTING (Technical and Economic Activities)

6. The general criteria, endorsed by the Council at its 110^{th} Session in November 1995 – which are mentioned in Resolution 7/2003 – and as subsequently reviewed in their revised formulation by the Programme Committee at its 89th Session are as follows:

- conformity to the Organization's mandate and relevance to the strategic objectives of the Organization as specified in the Strategic Framework;
- expressed priority and usefulness to a broad section of the membership or to special groups identified by the Governing Bodies, e.g. least developed countries, the small island developing states;
- FAO's comparative advantage in terms of potential for synergies through collaboration with partners, track record, avoidance of duplication with the work of other institutions and internal capacity;
- quality of programme design, including clarity of the causal link between the inputs provided and planned outputs and objectives;
- extent to which the achievement of Objective (Outcome) can be evaluated through the criteria and indicators proposed;
- probable cost-efficiency of the programme entity in mode of operation, including the use made of internal and external partnerships;
- likelihood of achieving desired Objective (Outcome) and substantive and sustainable impact.

7. Already at the stage of formulation of proposals for the MTP 2004-09, FAO units were invited to "score" entities under their responsibility, based on the above criteria.

8. In the context of the present exercise of revision of the PWB 2004-05, the results of the above criteria analysis offered an additional input to the departmental resource reallocation/ reduction process. This analytical input was correlated to the other key input, i.e. the expressions of priority made by Members to specific areas which – as mentioned above – had guided the categorization of activities to determine the overall reduction targets. Charts have been included at Major Programme level to illustrate the degree of correlation between the net reduction percentages effectively applied to specific entities, and the range of percentage cuts which could be expected from the preceding analysis.

ZRG BASE

9. It is recalled that the PWB 2004-05 document included two scenarios at the Real Growth (RG) and Zero Real Growth (ZRG) resource levels. Data in most tables was presented at constant (2002-03) costs, with, where appropriate, the impact of anticipated cost increases identified separately. In addition, although the main tables in the document did not include any exchange rate impact, as the final budget rate was not yet known, paragraphs 250 to 256 provided general information on the budget level and funding under split assessments and at various exchange rates.

10. To facilitate understanding vs. the tabular material in the PWB document, the following summary table shows the ZRG scenario adjusted for cost increases without the exchange rate impact versus the ZRG scenario adjusted for both cost increases and the exchange rate impact at the approved budget rate. It is the latter scenario amounting to US\$ 800.3 million that serves as the starting point for the various tables in this document.

11. The "other adjustments" in the column entitled *Exchange rate impact at 1.19 and other adjustments* refer to special allocations which were made within the cost increases and within the distribution of the exchange rate impact. For example, Chapters 1 and 3 received specific allocations for security costs. Furthermore, in order to apply the exchange rate effect appropriately by Chapter, expenditure between euro and other currencies was analyzed by chapter. As a result, Chapter 6, which has a very high percentage of euro-based expenditure, received a larger share of the exchange rate adjustment than, for example, Chapter 4, which has a low percentage of euro-based expenditure.

OVERALL RESOURCE AVAILABILITY AND SUMMARY OF REVISED PROPOSALS

12. As regards foreseen total resource availability, a table similar to that included in the PWB (paragraph 156) is provided below. This time, it illustrates movements in resources between the ZRG scenario adjusted for cost increases and the exchange rate impact at the approved budget rate, and the revised budget proposal in this document complemented by updated figures where appropriate, as follows.

Overview of Total Resource Availability (adjusted for cost increases at € 1 = US\$ 1.19)

13. The table shows slight changes in total Other Income, the most significant one being the increase of US\$ 2.8 million in Direct Operating Costs charged to Emergency Projects to reflect the impact of the increase in the rates.

14. The level of voluntary contributions under *Financial Regulation 6.7: Trust Fund* was revised under *Emergency Projects* to reflect the updated situation on Iraq – the closure of the Oil-For-Food Programme and the start-up of rehabilitation activities.

15. The preceding summary table reflects the differentiated budget reductions under both the Programme of Work and the Appropriation, in order to reach the approved level of US\$ 749.1 million in the Appropriations Resolution (from the ZRG scenario in the PWB recosted at the exchange rate of $1 \in =$ US\$ 1.19, i.e. totalling US\$ 800.3 million).

16. It may be noted that, in developing the revised budget, the underlying basis of the standard costs for staff has not been changed other than to reflect the approved budget rate of exchange. However, the Finance Committee's attention is drawn to two offsetting factors in the underlying costs.

17. The General Service (GS) language factor for Headquarters staff, estimated at US\$ 3.7 million for the biennium, was included in the standard rates for posts in 2004-05, pending the outcome of the appeal launched on behalf of the General Service staff to have the language factor reinstated. As the appeal was dismissed by the ILO Administrative Tribunal in February 2004, the provision within the standard rates for this purpose is no longer required. On the other hand, there is a needed increase in the estimated biennial current service cost of after service benefits, as a result of revised actuarial valuations that were released in early March 2004. As the increased cost which should be included in the standard rates is currently estimated to be at least US\$ 3.7 million for the biennium, the standard rates by location and grade used in the revised budget have not been changed. As usual, any variance between budgeted and actual staff costs will be monitored throughout the biennium and reported to the Finance Committee.

18. In the last section of this document entitled *Revised Programme Budget*, detailed tables show the *programme change* amounts at various levels of the established PWB programme structure, accompanied by narratives describing the attendant impact on the planned outputs outlined under the ZRG scenario in the PWB document. A brief synthesis is provided below.

19. Under Chapter 1 *General Policy and Direction*, the figure under Major Programme (MP) 1.1 *Governing Bodies* takes account of all possible cuts in resources for major meetings. The low or even positive figures for MP 1.2 and 1.3 stem respectively from: i) a substantial increase in resources for evaluation work, and ii) the higher costs for field security arrangements, in line with most recent inter-agency agreements. Under MP 1.2, an organizational change regarding the administrative unit hitherto servicing a number of ODG offices as well as cuts in other units, have partially offset the net increase deliberately made for evaluation activities over the original ZRG allocations.

20. Under Chapter 2, in the first instance, the relatively more favourable situation of MPs 2.3 *Fisheries* and 2.4 *Forestry* appears clearly from the table. Beyond that, it may be stressed that the percentage reductions under the component programmes and programme entities within each Major Programme (which are shown throughout the standard tabular material in the section *Revised Programme Budget*) are not the result of a simple "across-the-board" approach. They result from the conscious application by the concerned department heads of the criteria outlined above and take account of priorities formally expressed in Governing Bodies (e.g. IPPC, Codex, SPFS, etc.). In respect of the latter, it must be observed that these may create unavoidable, and often undesirable bias in favour of only those areas specifically mentioned by Members in interventions during discussions, or formally reflected in approved reports as their collective guidance. It is clear that the Secretariat must respect such guidance which forms the essence of the governance structure of an international organization. Regrettably, some areas such as the GIEWS or statistics, have recently tended to be mentioned less frequently or supported less emphatically than for instance TCP, forestry or fisheries although there is no doubt that they are also much

valued by the Membership. This aspect is being addressed in a document on priority setting submitted to the Programme Committee at the same session.

21. Under Chapter 3, three areas stand out among those which had to bear the brunt of reductions: the decentralized policy advisory teams of the TCA division (Programme 3.1.2 of MP 3.1), the Investment Support Programme of the TCI division covering cooperation with Financial Institutions other than the World Bank (Programme 3.2.2 of MP 3.2), and the FAORs (MP 3.4). In the latter case, as explained more fully in the pertinent narrative, the reductions result from a combination of measures, while not affecting the present country coverage of the FAOR Network (but no doubt impacting negatively on the quantity and quality of services provided by these offices). Selective cuts for the various units budgeted under MP 3.5 complete the global picture of resource changes under Chapter 3.

22. As regards Chapter 4, full protection was afforded to the Technical Cooperation Programme (TCP), in full consistency with the directives of Governing Bodies, the expectations from beneficiary countries and the central role of this Programme within the overall field activities carried out by FAO.

23. Under Chapters 5 and 6, it was not possible to shield from at times substantial reductions the activities of the GII division (MP 5.1) despite their intrinsic usefulness in disseminating FAO's messages, and those of the AF department (MP 5.2 and Chapter 6), despite recommendations of reputed management consultants and the concerns expressed by the External Auditor, especially regarding AFF and AFI divisions.

STAFFING IMPLICATIONS

24. The evolution of posts is given in the following table.

* The proposal includes 10 professional officers outposted from HQ: 4 from AUD, 2 from TCI, and 4 from various HQ Technical Departments. The PWB ZRG proposal included 16 outposted officers.

25. A net total of 232 posts, 89 Professional and 143 GS, need to be abolished in order to meet the required resource reductions from the ZRG scenario. FAO's staff establishment is to be reduced by 6.6 %, with reductions of 7.2% and 5.9% in the GS category and in the Professional category respectively.

26. FAO units will take advantage to the maximum extent possible of vacant posts, possible retirements of incumbents and redeployment opportunities while taking due account of Members' expressed priorities. With a budget reduction of this magnitude, however, the abolition of a limited number of encumbered posts will also be necessary.

27. Although most of the post abolitions will be effective as of the beginning of the current biennium, approximately 60 posts are to be abolished following retirement of the incumbents or other foreseen turnover during the 2004-05 biennium.

28. For the remaining post abolitions, the separation or redeployment of the incumbents of approximately 8 Professional and 40 GS posts is necessary. In this connection, redeployment task forces for the Professional and GS categories will be established to resolve these cases. Every effort is being made to keep redeployment and separation costs to a minimum, in part because of reliance on the use of arrears which have already been earmarked for specific purposes. It is

expected that the additional cost involved in resolving these cases will be approximately US\$ 3.5 million.

29. The extent of decentralization among the RP-funded posts is maintained: 6.8% of posts are to be abolished at HQ and 6.5% in the decentralized locations. Although no international Professional posts in FAOR offices are abolished, reductions are required as regards posts in the GS and National Professional Officers categories, for a total reduction of 43 posts in FAOR offices.

30. The Grade Point Average (GPA) increases slightly for RP Professional posts under the revised budget (from 4.00 to 4.04), as many lower-graded posts which were to be newly established in the ZRG scenario, will need to be cancelled.

31. The ratio of GS vs. Professional posts evolves from 1.29 under the ZRG scenario to 1.27 in the revised budget. The GS establishment decreases by 102 posts in non-FAOR locations; 41% of this reduction occurs in the occupational groups related to general administration and records and documents administration.

32. The major review of the GS category is expected to guide changes to workflows and the roles of support staff. As adequate training and development of staff concerned will be required to obtain the broader range of competencies, the absolute amounts of resources for staff development that were budgeted under the ZRG scenario will be maintained as a minimum for both GS and Professional staff.

33. No major change in organizational structures at the departmental level is anticipated at this juncture. Additional proposals may be considered in the course of the biennium, aiming at better aligning structure to the programme priorities or to generate efficiency gains.

34. Annex II lists all new and abolished posts under the RP, excluding NPO and GS posts in FAO Country Representations.

RISK ASSESSMENT

35. The PWB 2004-05 contained a brief list of the major risks to the achievement of the Programme of Work (C 2003/3, paragraphs 159-168), which was welcomed by the Finance Committee (CL 125/4, paragraph 54). The risk relating to Split Assessment has been addressed through approval of the related proposal by the Conference. The risk to Field Staff Security and Safety, and security in general, has been further responded to by an additional allocation of US\$ 3.7 million to Major Programme 1.3 *External Coordination and Liaison*, and Chapter 6 *Common Services*. Risks relating to *Systems Development Management, Inter-disciplinary Management Challenges*, and *Change in the Demand and Flexibility to Meet it*, remain as described.

36. The identified risk that the *Level of Funding* sought in the originally proposed PWB would not be agreed by Members has, in fact, resulted in this revised Programme of Work. In presenting this proposal, the Secretariat points out some additional areas of risk to implementation arising from the reduced budget level:

37. *Streamlining* - the likelihood that cost-saving measures to streamline services will be approved at the appropriate level (e.g. the Governing Bodies or senior management as applicable). Certain cost savings expected from proposals have been incorporated in the budget in anticipation that they will be approved and implemented during the biennium, including a reduction in the duration of and documentation for Governing Body sessions, streamlined publications distribution, and consolidated registry services. If the required actions do not

materialize in a timely manner, the savings not generated will have to be matched by reducing work in other areas.

38. Support and Common Services – the possibility of less than acceptable levels of service. As explained under Major Programme 5.2 and Chapter 6, there is a heightened risk to internal financial control and management, information system security, and basic infrastructure maintenance, although the budget provides for the minimal level of assurance in these areas.

39. Field Programme Approvals and Delivery – the impact of reduced technical and operational capacity on the rate of approval and quality of delivery of the field programme. Reduced allocations to decentralized policy assistance units and technical support services put at risk the capacity of the Organization to develop and maintain a field programme that adequately responds to Members' needs and requests. A reduced field programme would also put at risk the achievement of planned outcomes in the results-based technical programmes.

40. Income targets – the chance that higher standard staff costs will make some technical support services (TSS) non-competitive. Due to the strength of the euro, Professional staff standard costs have significantly increased over the previous biennium. Technical units have budgeted a portion of their Professional staff time to be charged out for support services. In view of the higher costs, project managers and other clients might seek alternative, less costly sources of technical support. This would also put at risk the essential contribution of TSS work to ensuring synergies between normative and operational work. A reduction in income would effectively reduce the total resources available to implement the programme of work in technical units.

EFFICIENCY SAVINGS

41. As reported in earlier documents, FAO's efforts at improving efficiency have so far focused on the more obvious input cost related savings. Beyond these, there is a need to look at cost reductions which might be generated through changes in structure and/or process. Inevitably, these take time to generate and hence this section is mostly of a "work-in-progress" nature.

Savings proposed in the current revised PWB 2004-05

- <u>Substantial reduction in the Administrative Unit in the Office of the Director-General (ODGX)</u> The Management Support Service in AF had arrived at the point where it was in a position to absorb most of the transaction processing undertaken by ODGX without additional staff. This will allow the application of the functioning model used in other HQ departments, wherein budget holders take direct responsibility for initiating and approving transactions. Four posts can be abolished at a saving of US\$ 535,000 per biennium.
- <u>Incentive-driven chargeback for publications distribution</u>
 Advances in technology will allow individual publication mailing and packing costs to be charged back to the concerned units, based upon bar-coding techniques. It is expected that by transferring the budget for complimentary copy distribution lists to these units and then charging for actual costs, much greater attention will be given to the need to minimize distribution costs. This would allow up to US\$ 700,000 per biennium although only part of this amount has been included in the present proposals, pending submission and approval by the Corporate Communications Committee.

<u>Streamlining Governance</u>
 The proposals assume savings of US\$ 1.3 million related to the following initiatives:

- The duration of the Conference could be reduced from 9 to 7 days.
- Conference working hours would not go beyond 18.00 hours, in order to avoid evening sessions.
- There would be fewer messengers available during Governing Body meetings.
- The total volume of documentation for all Governing Body meetings could be reduced by 10% in terms of word length.

A document on these and other proposals will be prepared for the Joint Meeting of the Programme and Finance Committees at their September Session, before eventual consideration by the Council in November 2004.

- <u>Restructuring of Registries and consolidation at departmental level</u>

The Digital Records Management System (DRMS) has reached the stage of maturity where it can be reasonably assumed that certain improvements can be made to the physical structure of registries – in particular, through their consolidation at departmental level. The proposals include the benefits of the pilot implementation of this approach in the ES department as well as reductions in related Registry functions across the Organization resulting in net savings of US\$ 537,000 per biennium). If this is successful, further savings can be expected to result from the progressive implementation of the approach in other departments in future biennia.

<u>MSS post reductions</u>

It will be possible to reduce the number of posts in the MSS because of improved practices and procedures. Savings being proposed will total close to US\$ 1.0 million, although not all of this amount can be attributed to increased efficiency, as there may also be some reduction in service or transfer of work to other units.

<u>Workflow improvements</u>

Many posts are proposed to be eliminated for a variety of reasons such as further improvements in productivity, changes in programme requirements, outsourcing, etc. As such it is difficult, without considerable detailed analysis, to clearly attribute specific savings to efficiency *per se*. However, it is estimated that efficiency savings could be as much as US\$ 3 million per biennium.

Tentative areas for potential efficiency savings under review

42. The following tentative areas stem from a renewed search for ideas on how to generate more efficiency savings, although undoubtedly not all of them will come to fruition. Others will be dependent upon the availability of resources to cover pre-requisite on-time investment for their realization.

- Cost of inputs
 - Redirecting procurement action to sources outside the euro zone.
 - Implementation of a lump-sum arrangement for Removal of Household Goods this has been already been implemented in several UN system organizations and needs to be investigated for FAO.
 - Travel Arrangements although a major source of savings in the 1996-97 reduction exercise, it is now worth revisiting this area through two avenues: the first will be a reissue of the tender; and the second through a coordinated effort with other UN system bodies to benefit from the UN's overall bargaining power with airlines.
 - Elimination or reduction of handling and storage costs increased use of print on demand could greatly reduce the need to store excessive numbers of publications.

- Structural changes
 - Outsourcing mainframe services to ICC outsourcing so far has been implemented on a no loss/no gain basis but can, subject to some investment, now lead to cost savings with the transfer of FAO systems to a larger UN shared facility.
 - Outsourcing and/or relocation of administrative/financial transaction processing considerable cost saving can theoretically be made by outsourcing IT and administrative work to developing countries or, alternatively, by building capacity in a suitable Regional Office, where the cost of GS posts is much lower than at HQ.
 - Information Technology Officer posts were established in each HQ department as part of the 1996-97 revised budget in an effort to accelerate the application of IT solutions at the departmental level. Ten years later, technological sophistication throughout the Organization has increased such that the need for these posts is less compelling – several departments have already eliminated them and the need for them in the remaining departments and Regional Offices will be reviewed.
- Process changes
 - Human Resources Management System (HRMS) this major development which includes integration and interfacing many individual systems, is bound to have implications for efficiency throughout the house. The benefits cannot yet be quantified and are unlikely to be realized before 2006 and following years.
 - Streamlining of Regional and Country level administrative activities following the extensive internal review of the MSU and Regional Operations Branch in RAP, several actions, including changes in delegations and decentralization of travel processing, should result in savings which should eventually flow to other regions.
 - Information Systems Governance the KPMG report on staffing in the AFI division identified governance to be insufficient, such that multiple IT platforms are maintained simultaneously for much longer than should be necessary (N.B. the introduction of capital budgeting is also expected to partially address the same problem). The staffing levels of AFI were expected to be eventually reduced as a result of improved IT governance. Under the ZRG scenario, additional staff had been proposed to strengthen the governance function. Unfortunately, these new posts have had to be cancelled in the revised budget thus greatly slowing progress in this area.
 - Streamlining business processes in the MSS although progress has been made, a working group is being established to examine the possibilities of further improvement.
- <u>Governance</u>
 - Reduction of maximum length of meetings documentation e.g. the possibility of reducing the maximum length of meetings documentation from 6,400 words to 5,000 (a 22% reduction).
 - Application of UN Secretariat system-wide best practices for Governing Body Meetings
 it implies reviewing UN experience and determining applicability to FAO environment.
 - Elimination of verbatim records i.e. reviewing the implications of limiting verbatim records to be replaced by indexed digital recordings available on CDs.
- <u>Other</u>
 - Improved management of Miscellaneous Income and Reserve Funds through enhanced management of FAO's investments.
 - Ways and means of improving support cost recovery both for Technical Support Services (TSS) and for Administrative and Operational Support Services (AOS).

43. The Secretariat will pursue the search for such savings with vigour and will report back to the Finance Committee in due course. In general, however, Finance Committee support is sought for a framework of adequate incentives in the generation of efficiency savings: that is, for the units generating savings to benefit from their effort in some appropriate manner, which may need to vary from case to case. Without such incentives, it is difficult to motivate managers to commit valuable time and resources to such efforts.

ACTION FOR THE PROGRAMME AND FINANCE COMMITTEES

44. The Committees are invited to review the Director-General's proposal for a revised version of the Approved Budget in line with their respective areas of competence so as to enlighten the Joint Meeting.

45. The Joint Meeting is requested to endorse the revised budget.

46. The Finance Committee is requested to approve the following budgetary transfers between Chapters as per Financial Rule 4.5b).

REVISED PROGRAMME BUDGET

47. This part of the document derives baseline information from the section with the same title in the PWB 2004-05 document (C 2003/3). The narratives below do not repeat the descriptive material about the scope of activities and the major substantive thrusts, or the objectives of individual entities, which remain generally valid. They focus essentially on the eventual impact of resource reductions set against the ZRG scenario in C 2003/3. For technical and economic programmes, ZRG output lists have been reproduced, with changes indicated by specific "markers". Thus, affected outputs appear as "eliminated" (struck out in the text) or reduced (those with the \checkmark sign). In very limited cases, the resource reallocation process has resulted in "new" outputs to be formulated. Charts at the Major Programme level address the application of criteria for priority setting. A revised list of planned sessions is provided in Annex 3.

48. It may be noted that against an original population of over 1,200 outputs, 9% of them have been eliminated, about 29% have been reduced, while only a few new outputs have been included.

52. A major change relates to the transformation of the administrative unit hitherto supporting a number of offices in ODG *lato sensu* (ODGX), in line with the management support arrangements presently in place for Headquarters (HQ) departments since 2000, adapted to the specific characteristics of this group of offices. Hence, a much smaller unit would remain within ODG, basically to provide budget and human resource planning support to these offices. Other administrative tasks, such as for personnel services, would be absorbed by the Management Support Service (MSS) in AFD, as the latter does for HQ departments. This will entail the assignment of budget holder responsibility directly to the various ODG offices.

53. This change would lead to savings through the abolition of four GS posts, which would assist in mitigating the impact of cuts elsewhere. It is recalled that the costs of the former ODGX (the same approach would remain for the smaller unit) were apportioned to the budgetary provisions of the various offices it assisted (entities with code ending with S9).



Programme 2.1.0: Intra-departmental Entities

62. Support to the Commission on Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture (CGRFA, 210P1) and to the PAIA on Ethics in Food and Agriculture will be slightly reduced, with priority given to activities of the Interim Committee of the International Treaty on Plant Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture. Activities related to the latter treaty will also significantly depend on extrabudgetary resources during the biennium. While entity 210S1 supporting the biennial meetings of the Committee on Agriculture (COAG) will not be affected, 210S2 Technical Services for Partnership Development and Information Enhancement will include less work on the planning and management of departmental publications and communications, as well as contributions to global perspective studies. Reductions are to affect the implementation, both at departmental and divisional levels, of entity 210A1 Sustainable Intensification of Integrated Production Systems, with less opportunities for undertaking field activities in pilot SPFS sites and the coordination of cross-site appraisal of integrated production strategies and good practices. The work on the normative and operational components of 210A2 Promotion of Conservation Agriculture is also affected. However, the joint FAO/IAEA division (AGE) will be able to devote increased resources to this area, i.e. for work on validated models of nutrient and water dynamics and carbon sequestration and soil erosion. Regrettably, the central provision to support implementation of PAIAs had to be cut by onethird (210S5).

Programme 2.1.1: Natural Resources

63. In line with the priority on water management and conservation expressed by Governing Bodies, work on: Water Use Efficiency and Conservation (211A1); Integrated Land, Water and Plant Nutrition Policies, Planning and Management (211A3); and Land and Water Quality Improvement (211A5) has been protected to the extent possible. However, some specific outputs may be affected by the overall reduction in both staff and non-staff resources. In particular, post adjustments at regional level would regrettably reduce the level of technical support and assistance in capacity building on land and water management in the respective regions. In addition, due to the abolition of a number of posts at Headquarters, less resources would be available for field programme support, including formulation and backstopping of TCP, SPFS and emergency projects, and for direct advisory services to Members. As evident from the preceding table and output lists below, work on Land and Soil Productivity (211A2), Information Systems, Databases and Statistics (211P7), Knowledge Management and Partnerships (211P8), and Direct Support to Member Nations and the Field Programme (211S1) would need to be significantly slowed down. Support would be maintained for the International Programme for Technology and Research in Irrigation and Drainage (IPTRID, 211S2), albeit at a reduced level.

Relative priority has been maintained for a number of key areas: the Plant Pests Component of EMPRES (212A4); the Mainstreaming of IPM by Enhancing Essential Ecological Processes (212A5); Conservation and Sustainable Use of Plant Genetic Resources (212A9); the Secretariat of the International Plant Protection Convention (IPPC, 212P1); Pesticide Management, including work for PIC and the Rotterdam Convention (212P2); Migratory Pest Management (212P3); and Technical Support to the International Treaty on PGRFA (212P4). Nonetheless, the pace of some activities will be negatively affected. While support to effective national desert locust early warning systems is to continue under EMPRES, coordination of national programmes, emergency operations on locust and other migratory pests, and work on improved emergency prevention will need to be reduced. IPM work will give priority to field implementation, whereas the production of guidance material, based on lessons learned from field activities, will be more limited. The regional phytosanitary information system of the Asia and Pacific Plant Protection Commission will be severely curtailed. Regular Programme funding for the participation of developing countries in standardsetting, and in the information system of the IPPC has been reduced. This will be offset during the current biennium by arrears funding. Reduced availability of guidance material may delay the implementation of the International Code of Conduct on the Distribution and Use of Pesticides. It will not be possible to achieve the expected acceleration in the rate of recommendations for Maximum Pesticide Residue Levels (MRLs) of pesticides in food, to the Codex Alimentarius Commission. The preparation of the second edition of the State of the World's Report of PGRFA and the implementation of both the Global Information System and supportive networks under the IT-PGRFA may experience delays. Policy and technical guidance on sustainable use of PGRFA, including plant breeding and biotechnology, will be more limited.

Under 212A9, development of seed policies and capacity building in the implementation of the Global Plan of Action for seed production, will only be slightly affected. The biggest impact of budgetary reductions is on crop production and grassland management activities (212A1, 212A3 and 212P5), while some of the adjustments aim to respond to the recommendations of the evaluation of FAO activities in crop production, endorsed by the Programme Committee at its 90th Session in September 2003. In crop production, support to sustainable development of rice-based systems will be greatly reduced, particularly in Africa, as well as to the International Rice Commission and to integrated crop production systems for food security and rural incomes. Lower resources are available to provide technical support to Members on various aspects of crop production and protection, though it is expected that these will be partly compensated through higher levels of income generated under projects.

65. The livestock programme will seek to maintain momentum of action under several highprofile entities: transboundary animal disease control (213A7 – EMPRES – Livestock); Veterinary Public Health Management and Food and Feed Safety (213A6); Environmental Management of Insect-Borne Diseases (213A9), for which cuts are relatively minor. The same will apply to two cross-sectoral entities: Livestock Sector Analysis and Strategy Development (213B1) and the Global Livestock Information System and Knowledge Framework (213P1). However, as evident from the list below, the delivery of a number of biennial outputs will be delayed or reduced. Despite lower resources, work on Technologies and Systems for Efficient Natural Resource Use in Livestock Production (213A8) is to lead to good practices for sustainable resource use in both intensifying and extending animal production systems. The EMPRES-livestock programme will need to take account of recent developments (avian influenza etc.), particularly in the Asia region which has the largest and fastest-growing livestock sector in the world. Extra-budgetary support under strategic partnership agreements with donors is expected to complement or allow for substitution of RP resources, particularly for normative activities. These relate especially to 213A3 Contribution of Livestock to Poverty Alleviation, 213A5 Developing the Global Strategy for the Management of Farm Animal Genetic Resources, as well as the other entities referred to above. Regrettably, entity 21381 would have to be severely curtailed.

66. The impact of the budgetary reductions is relatively balanced across the programme. Continued attention will be given to work on Enhancing Food Quality and Safety by Strengthening Handling, Processing and Marketing in the Food Chain (214A9). A review of regional posts, which had been pending since earlier restructuring of the AGS division will result in the streamlining of staff resources in support of the programme. Regionally, a critical mass of expertise will be maintained in Africa and Asia, whereas most of the required technical support and project backstopping in other regions, where more local capacity exists, is to be provided from Headquarters. Overall capacity to provide technical support services to Members will nevertheless be reduced by approximately 14 percent. Insufficient staff dealing with farm and agribusiness management will lead to less training materials for building business management skills, particularly under 214A1 Enhancing Small Farmer Livelihoods and 214A4 Agribusiness Development Targeted to Small and Medium *Post-production Enterprises.* Similarly, reduced expertise in marketing economics will diminish support to marketing services, with a major impact upon 214A3 Sustainable Commercial Provision of Input Supply, Mechanization, Investment Support and Marketing Services. Limited staff expertise in agroprocessing and agro-industries will also restrict new initiatives in these fields. Activity under 214A2 Meeting Urban Food Needs will be maintained at a reduced level, including through the services of the outposted officer in the FAO Representation in Algiers and the use of non-staff resources. Work on Agricultural Services - Data and Information Systems (214P2) would have to be curtailed.

67. While maintaining, to the extent possible, the agreed FAO contribution to the joint programme with IAEA, reductions to some activities had to be made. Under 215A1 work on understanding nutrient and water dynamics under conservation agriculture and to develop protocols for molecular characterization and selection of germplasm containing mutated genes will be more limited than planned, leading to delayed outputs. Under 215A2, work on screwworms will be restricted to providing technical and policy advice. Under 215P1, training modules and workshops for policy and technical-level decision makers within the framework of good agricultural practices will deal only with fertilizers, pesticides and veterinary drug residues. Similar work on mycotoxins will be eliminated and the information made available through the International Food Contaminant and Residues Information System scaled down.



68. The inter-department entity, 220A1 Food Insecurity and Vulnerability Information for Better Decision Making (FIVIMS) has been given maximum priority, as it aims at strengthening the effectiveness of FIVIMS, both internationally and at the national level. The annual publication, "The State of Food Insecurity in the World (SOFI)" is to continue as a major output, although new estimates of the number of undernourished will be issued only once in every two years. The retention of two issues of SOFI per biennium implies a significant commitment of remaining non-staff resources, hence the reduction of several outputs shown in the following list. The coverage of analyses required for WFS and MDG monitoring through entity 220P1 World Food Summit and Millennium Development Goals Monitoring and Action will regrettably have to be less comprehensive. The duration of the CFS Sessions (220S1) will revert to four days, with a corresponding reduction in agenda items and ancillary activities, such as side events. This has allowed for a more adequate provision to be made for staff support, hence the same level for the budget provision.

69. Codex (221P2) and Codex-related work (221P6) are granted a high degree of "protection" in compliance with the recommendations of the Codex Alimentarius Commission. Therefore, the reduction of activities is expected to be minimal. There will be less work on capacity building for food control systems under 221P5 *Food Quality Control and Consumer Protection*. Under 221P1 *Nutrient Requirements and Dietary Assessment for Food Safety and Quality*, affected outputs are the cancellation of a joint FAO/WHO expert consultation on nutrients requirements. As regards work on nutrition programmes, activities on urban nutrition under 221A2 *Nutrition Improvement for Sustainable Development* will be eliminated. Those on community nutrition, nutrition education as well as nutrition and HIV/AIDS, aimed at improving the access to and consumption of nutritionally adequate diets by the poor, will be reduced. Publications, training courses and capacity building efforts will also be reduced under 221A4 *Community Action for Household Food*

Security and Nutrition, and 221A5 Food and Nutrition Education, Communications and Training. The development of normative materials and training courses will be curtailed under 221A6 Nutrition and Household Food Security in Emergencies. The Journal: "Food, Nutrition and Agriculture" (221P7) will have to be discontinued, with communication activities restricted to improved web publishing. Efforts will be made to seek additional extra-budgetary funding for normative activities and technical assistance to countries.

70. The much reduced allocations for one of the two core statistical entities, 222P2 Agricultural Production, Trade Statistics and Food Balance Sheets will inevitably constrain the capacity of the Organization to provide Members and the international community with comprehensive information and data based on common concepts, standards and definitions for international comparisons and to reflect the global situation. Country coverage of current primary statistical data will be less comprehensive (with increased reliance on estimation), the World Food Survey will be discontinued and updates of Regional and World Summary of Food and Agricultural Statistics will be issued less frequently. Food Balance Sheets and under-nourishment statistics will be produced only once every two years, and monitoring of government expenditures in agriculture may not be done as fully as desirable. Publication of the Statistical Bulletin will stop (with data available on-line). Efficiency gains for collecting, processing and disseminating statistical information are expected to be realized towards the end of the biennium, as the system FAOSTAT2 comes on-line, which may partly offset the negative effects. Assistance to national capacity building for statistical information systems will also suffer under 222P3 Agricultural Statistics Development and 22281 Technical Support Services to Member Nations and the Field Programme. For Africa, this will be offset in part by extra-budgetary resources (PARIS21, World Bank) foreseen to complement entity 222A2 FAO/World Bank/USDA Initiative for Agricultural Statistics in Africa.

71. As regards the entities implemented by the GIL division, under 222A5 further development of the World Agriculture Information Resource system will be reduced, including support to the AGORA project. Under 222P6 WAICENT Corporate Information Management and Dissemination Systems, reduced staff will negatively affect corporate information management services to FAO and Members. Under 222P7 Standards, Norms and Procedures for Improved Access to Agricultural Information, several outputs have had to be reduced, impacting on the efficiency of data exchange between FAO, Members and other international partners. The budget allocations to 222P8 Facilitation of WAICENT Outreach and 222S2 Assistance to Countries in Capacity Building for Agriculture and Food Information through WAICENT, will have to absorb at least in part the training outputs eliminated from 222A5, 222P7 and 222P9. The planned Consultation on Agricultural Information Management under 22282 has been cancelled, while alternative mechanisms will be used to pursue dialogue with interested countries. A decrease in technical staff under 222P9 Virtual Library and Library Information Services in Support of WAICENT will reduce GIL's capacity to maintain a complete collection of the Organization's technical information products. Furthermore, extending virtual library services to regional and country offices will be slowed down, together with reduced delivery of FAO's information to Members.

72. Finally, entity 222P5 *Programme for the Improvement of Language Coverage* has been afforded full protection in view of the importance attached by Governing Bodies to this aspect of FAO's work.

73. Concerning work on current food supply/demand assessments, the *Global Information and Early Warning System on Food and Agriculture* (223P6) will need to adjust its capacity to alert the world community about emerging food shortages to its reduced resource allocation, despite the fact that demands from Members for GIEWS missions, both for regular and emergency assessments, is expected to continue at a high level in 2004-05. It is hoped that recourse to TCP resources for GIEWS missions would partly compensate for this reduction. The frequency of Food Outlook will be reduced to four issues per year and Foodcrops and Shortages to three per year – to be partially offset by increased dissemination of information via the GIEWS website. The coverage and content of the annual flagship publication, "The State of Food and Agriculture" (223P2), will be substantially reduced, unless significant cost reductions for its production can be achieved.

74. As regards prospective work on agricultural commodities, the capacity to monitor and assess medium-term developments in basic foods and tropical, horticultural and raw material commodity markets and their impacts on food security, under 223P3 and 223P5, will no longer be as comprehensive as hitherto. This may be partly compensated by greater use of web-based technologies and other models for data processing and reporting; also, monitoring of markets will be de-emphasized in favour of periodic analytical reviews under 223P4.

75. Studies under 223A2 *Global Food and Agricultural Perspective Studies*, will have to be more selective, while still ensuring longer-term assessments related to the World Food Summit and Millennium Development Goals. Revision of the analytical framework for these studies will be delayed. Reductions under 223S1 Technical Support Services to Member Nations and Field Programme will imply less direct support for member countries. Consideration will also be given to reducing the duration of the Committee on Commodity Problems (possibly in conjunction with other related statutory meetings).

76. Both the Organization's response to Members' demands for problem-oriented policy advice and assistance, and its advocacy role for greater priority to be accorded to hunger and poverty reduction are underpinned by this programme and will be somewhat hampered by lower budgetary allocations. For instance, core work of policy analysis of the persistence of hunger, food insecurity and poverty issues, including environmental and natural resources in agricultural policy, will be severely constrained. Under 224P1 *Agricultural Adjustment and Policy Reforms*, 224P2 *Agriculture, Poverty Alleviation, Rural Development and Food Security – Analysis of Linkages*, and 224P3 *Economics of Natural Resources and Environmental Sustainability*, fewer case studies for analyzing impacts on poor households of policy reforms and environmental threats would have to be carried out. CUREMIS, the joint ESA and TCA series on Current and Emerging Issues for Economic Analysis and Policy Research on food and agriculture development, will be discontinued.

77. Work on trade policy has been somewhat "protected" in relative terms, as priority is given to strengthening national capacities of developing countries for their participation in bilateral and multilateral trade negotiations, and formulation of corresponding national policies. Nevertheless, there will be less resources for analysis of trade issues under 224A2 *Commodity and Trade Policy Support to Developing Countries for Trade Negotiations*. Capacity to provide direct support to Members will also be affected under 224P5 *Enhancing Diversification and Competitiveness of Agricultural Commodities*. Efforts will be made to obtain extra-budgetary and TCP resources to maintain the momentum of capacity building activities under 224P4 *Analysis and Consensus-Building on Emerging Commodity and Trade Issues*, together with TCA.



78. Reductions have been met principally through adjustments to staffing levels (a combination of abolitions and downgrading of posts). This will have consequential impact on originally planned outputs, including cancellation of outputs related to technical support to FIRMS partners (some reduced activity will be supported by arrears funding), analysis of data needs for ecosystem-based management and technical support to regional fishery bodies on statistical programmes. Other outputs will be decreased. Extra-budgetary resources are being sought to support implementation of the Strategy for Improving Information on Status and Trends of Capture Fisheries, adopted by the Council and endorsed by the UN General Assembly in 2003.

Resource cuts had to be somewhat evenly distributed across the Programme as it was necessary to maintain a reasonable balance between work on marine fisheries on the one hand and on aquaculture on the other. As a whole, the entities particularly directed to Marine Resources (232A3, 232A4, 232A5 and 232S1) have seen minor reallocations resulting in reduced activity levels under almost all biennial outputs. No changes are made for posts. Under the entities related to inland fisheries and aquaculture (232A1, 232A2 and 232S2), output lists have been amended, also to take account of activities recommended by the COFI Sub-committee on Aquaculture.

Again, reductions will more particularly affect the two primarily "demand-orientated" entities under this programme, i.e. 234S1 *Promotion and Strengthening of Regional Fisheries Bodies and Arrangements* and 234S2 *Direct Support to Countries in Fisheries Policy and Management.* Entity 234A1 *Coordination and Monitoring of the Implementation of the Code of Conduct for Responsible Fisheries* will also be reduced. This will be accompanied by a decreased number of meetings (workshops and expert consultations) and of publications. For instance, one of the working groups on ACFR and the planned studies on the effects of HIV/AIDS on small-scale fishing communities, the production



82. While not major in relative terms, the primary impact of reduced budget provisions will be on the dissemination and application of normative work at the field level in developing countries. 83. The substantial budget reduction has led to re-structuring of planned biennial outputs under this programme. 84. 

86. Regrettably, Programme 2.5.1 will need to undergo further net resource cuts, beyond those already reflected in the ZRG scenario in the PWB document. A substantial loss of professional capacity (five posts), coupled with lower non-staff allocations, will severely impact on the quantity and quality of outputs and services offered to countries in this important area, such as information tools for increased institutional efficiency, support to the SPFS, training materials and capacity building in research, extension, education and communication. The programme will not be able to maintain adequate corporate responsibility for coordinating FAO's training activities (as recommended by the 89th Programme Committee). In addition, resources were shifted from Programme 2.5.1 (251A1 and 251P3) to Programme 2.5.2, as the Gender and Population Division (SDW), which contributed substantially to these two entities, will no longer be in a position to do so. However, provision for 251P4 *Secretariat of the CGLAR Science Council* reflects continued commitment to this joint activity, together with other partners.

87. A further decline in technical normative outputs related to environment and natural resources will be experienced due to loss of staff and non-staff resources. The greatest negative impact is on supporting the implementation of multi-lateral environmental agreements, agroecosystem analysis, organic agriculture and rural energy. Technical reports and policy documents related to such important subjects as biodiversity, climate change, desertification, rural energy, organic agriculture, adequacy of environmental observing systems and agro-ecosystem management have had to be cancelled. There will be proportionally less impact on other activities, i.e. agrometeorology, geo-spatial data and information, global environmental change, and use of remote sensing to support early warning systems and emergency and rehabilitation

actions. Due to its importance, work on environmental impact assessment is maintained at a minimum level.

88. Active formulation and implementation of bio-energy projects through the Clean Development Mechanism and the Global Environment Facility will no longer be feasible, and the same will apply to work on indicators of sustainable development. Support to the Global Terrestrial Observing System will be reduced, affecting activities related to terrestrial carbon observation and participation to the inter-governmental initiative on earth observations.

Programme 2.5.2: Gender and Population

89. The reductions come at a time when this programme already had to cope with the elimination of significant UNFPA-funding, and while it faces increasing demands relating to the impact of the HIV/AIDS epidemic on agriculture and food security. Already in the ZRG scenario of the PWB, staff and non-staff resources for gender activities had been reduced in order to co-fund a temporary P-5 senior officer post on HIV/AIDS. The required further staff reductions will negatively impact on the gender and development programme in the European region, and reduce capacity to meet demands from countries for training workshops and networks to mitigate the impact of HIV/AIDS and food security. The planned thematic and geographical expansion of capacity building and training efforts in gender disaggregated data collection and analysis, case studies on gender and resource management, and SEAGA workshops will all be reduced.

90. In order to maintain capacity to meet demands from Members in relation to land tenure (entity 253A1), some resources have been shifted from programme 251 (entity 251A1). Despite cumulative, severe loss of staff capacity in relation to farmers' organizations and rural cooperatives, a minimal level of activity will be ensured under 253A2. Work on SARD under the same entity has been "protected" in relative terms, in view of the priority attached by Governing Bodies to this area. Given the critical role of the UN System Network on Rural Development and Food Security (253P1) in supporting concerted action in countries in follow-up to the WFS, it was not possible to leave the allocation at such a low level (as foreseen in the ZRG scenario) and a higher provision is made for a viable, yet minimal programme of activities. This will clearly not be sufficient to support country-level Thematic Groups and website establishment and maintenance, as originally foreseen.

91. Regrettably, a substantial net resource cut was also required under 253S1, at the expense of further development of the field programme.

92. The SPFS as a whole has been afforded relative protection, and particularly entity 256P3 which supports implementation of approved programmes. Thus, the required cuts affect particularly the entity on *Formulation* (256P2), therefore hampering capacity to respond to requests for upscaling of national programmes and to new demands. This will reduce the incremental number of beneficiary countries, as well as slow down access of participating countries to essential food security activities. The reduction of available resources will place a special onus on the entity on *Management and Coordination* to mobilize extra-budgetary resources from donors and financing institutions.



93. The reduced resources will hamper TCA's efforts to support the development of the Field Programme and will affect planned activities to enhance capacities of countries and regional partners, in particular Regional Economic Organizations, to prepare, implement and evaluate sectoral and sub-sectoral policies. A number of training materials, workshops and Field Programme development activities will have to be eliminated or curtailed. Under 311P4, the reduction is due to efficiency gains, thus not affecting outputs.

94. As the TCA division was obliged to eliminate several posts in its decentralized policy advisory teams, the dislocation to planned activities will be particularly harmful in the regions, although maximum effort has been made to keep non-staff resources to acceptable levels. Regrettably, this budgetary restraint is taking place in a context of the growing complexity of tasks assigned to the decentralized units, in terms of servicing country task forces, maintaining analytical databases, and continuously updating assessments of requirements. Support to FAORs, the implementation of capacity-building workshops and TCA's assistance to resource mobilization and rehabilitation strategies and programmes following emergencies are also to suffer from resource constraints.

Major Programme 3.2: Support To Investment

96. The Investment Centre division (TCI) spearheads FAO's response to the growing consensus among the international financing institutions (IFIs) that there is a need to raise the share of agriculture in their portfolio, so that the goals set by the WFS/WFS:fyl and the UN Millennium Declaration could be met. With the reduced level of resources, TCI's capacity to leverage funds for investment promotion will be diminished and the division may not be able to respond to all of the demands from partner IFIs in the requisite manner.

97. In view of the continuing strong increase in demand from the World Bank, TCI will aim at meeting existing commitments in the level of cooperation with this key partner. On the other hand, as regards the Investment Support Programme covering other partner institutions, the much reduced allocation and attendant staff cuts will not support the volume of work carried out in the past with these important partners which have been built up over a long period of collaboration. Moreover, TCI will have to curtail support to key programmes within the Organization, as only priority work for which compensatory resources can be provided will be carried out.

98. Resource cuts will concern primarily programme 3.3.2. Further enhancement and development of the FPMIS will not be possible, beyond what available funding from arrears would allow to achieve. The intended improvements in the operational capacity of the FAOR country office staff through interactive workshops and consultations in the Regions, may also be negatively affected. Furthermore, HQ participation in and facilitation of these activities would be impaired. Therefore, training and backstopping efforts will be limited to streamlining procedures, long-distance learning packages with inter-active CDs and the web-based Field Programme Manual. There would also be reduced flexibility to respond to unforeseen problems in the regional and country offices.

99. The net reduction under this Major Programme results from vacancy management of FAO Representation staff and the phased abolition of some 40 GS posts. At HQ, OCD will reduce its support staff capacity by abolishing two GS posts and by further reducing the already-limited non-staff provisions. This will result in lower operational and administrative support from HQ to the FAOR Network.

100. Mitigating measures will, to the extent possible, be put in place to reduce the adverse impact of the above reductions. For instance, FAORs are expected to have enhanced access to the resources previously channelled through the Small-scale Facility and the TCP Facility to facilitate use of local technical and policy expertise. Strengthening of technical capacities will be sought through budget-neutral measures, such as the placement of South-South Cooperation/SPFS experts in FAO Representations, use of APOs and volunteers from various sources. Internal reimbursement and cost-recovery schemes will be reviewed to establish a better linkage between the functions performed by, and workload of, FAO Representations and the resources at their disposal.

101. The reductions described above, despite mitigating measures, are bound to have negative implications on the functional and operational capacity of the FAOR Network and may result in reduced responsiveness of – or less efficient service delivery by – FAO Representations. They may reduce the scope for participation in UN Country Team activities (e.g. CCA/UNDAF),

country-level support to normative programmes or the advocacy/outreach work of FAORs. The impact on the visibility and effectiveness of FAO's work at country-level may, of course, vary from country to country.

102. Under Programme 3.5.1, beyond the limited cut to the provision, the expected negative impact is on account of the loss of decentralized posts, which were to have greatly assisted with key activities. Therefore, more limited progress can be expected in three priority areas:

- the expansion of the Unilateral Trust Fund (UTF) programme;
- the consolidation of donor partnership programmes, the adoption of national execution modalities, and the fuller integration of normative with operational activities;
- the mobilization of resources decentralized to regional and national levels by many donors and multilateral institutions.

103. The abolition of one GS post in support of the Associate Professional Officer (APO) programme will hamper capacity to fully promote and develop this very useful programme.

104. Under Programme 3.5.2, planned outreach initiatives to NGOs and private sector partners would have to be revised downwards, to ensure essential tasks in the light of available resources. Efforts will be made to identify extra-budgetary resources to offset partially the shortfall under Regular Programme resources.

105. Programme 3.5.2 also includes the work of the General Affairs and Information Department and other units for coordination, planning and implementation of World Food Day activities, the use of FAO Ambassadors and promotion of country level involvement and civil society participation through the dissemination of information. In order to continue this work within a reduced level of resources, including less staff, the information campaigns for WFD and TeleFood, including the use of FAO Ambassadors, will be more fully integrated. Greater use of the Internet will be made, wherever pertinent, while the advocacy role of FAO Ambassadors will be supported only with extra-budgetary funding. There will be greater reliance on FAO National Committees for awareness-raising in respective countries.

106. Under programme 3.5.3, the abolition of one Professional and one GS post will reduce OCD's capacity to fully promote Partnership Programmes. Where possible, efforts will be made to mitigate the adverse impact through further streamlining of procedures.

107. The provision under Chapter 4 has been fully protected from the ZRG level in the PWB.

108. This takes account of Governing Bodies' directives concerning the TCP (e.g. Conference Resolution 9/89), the consistent expressions of support from beneficiary countries and the critical, often catalytic role of TCP assistance, as was fully explained in the PWB document.

109. Concerns by some Members that resources are not being fully utilized should be alleviated in the light of recent results. The following statistics show a major upturn in delivery as a proportion of the Appropriation, signalling an end to the problems which were mostly related to the settling in of decentralization.

110. In addition, it should be noted that the current rate of approvals has risen to a level which cannot be matched by the Appropriation. For example, in 2002-03, approvals totalled US\$ 113 million versus an Appropriation of US\$ 89.2 million. Obviously, the current level of the Appropriation is not sufficient, which adds to the justification for full protection of the level in the ZRG scenario.

The loss of posts will need to be matched by reduction in output and there will need to be greater reliance on resources provided by technical departments to carry out publishing management functions and implement outreach and communication campaigns. Non-staff resources will also be reduced to critical levels. In particular, resource constraints will entail less translation of titles into non-official languages.

112. In seeking to achieve reduced budget targets, due attention was given to preserving staff resources, but given the limited non-staff resources available to the divisions under this Major Programme, the cuts inevitably impacted on staffing levels, with a total reduction of 21 posts.

113. Despite the reductions, maximum efforts will be made to retain core services, although the timeliness and high standards of these services may be difficult to maintain. The greatest

impact will be felt in terms of new initiatives which will be severely restricted. More detailed assessment of the impact by programme is given below.

Programme 5.2.1: Financial Services

114. It is recalled that the primary functions of the Finance Division (AFF) are to: manage a flow of receipts and payments of over US\$ 1 billion each year in accordance with the Organization's rules and regulations and in conformity with requisite internal controls, maintain systems to record over three million entries in the accounts of the Organization each year, report operating and financial results and provide timely financial information to all levels within the Organization and to the Governing Bodies. The Finance Division prepares the financial statements of the Organization in accordance with international standards and accounting principles for audit and certification by the External Auditor. The division also covers the Organization's worldwide investment, cash management and currency exchange needs.

115. AFF has very limited discretionary non-staff resources and the original ZRG scenario had added three posts to reach the minimum staffing level recommended by independent management consultants and to meet the concerns expressed by the External Auditor. Current overall budgetary constraints make it necessary to impose the abolition of five GS posts. It is clear that this reduced staffing will not only cause delays in response times and generate backlogs, but the increased work volumes for the remaining staff may heighten the risk of errors and could weaken internal control and impact financial management.

Programme 5.2.2: Information Systems and Technology Services

116. The provision under this programme covers only the direct managerial costs of the Information Systems and Technology Division (AFI), with the exception of the Director and one Secretary who are included under Programme Management. The remaining costs of information technology (IT) services are distributed to the various programmes making use of the information technology infrastructure, network and telecommunications services, and computerized applications. Both the External Auditor and the same reputed management consultants have called for adequate staff for AFI. It is not possible in the circumstances to meet these recommendations and regrettably, some post abolitions need to be effected. The reduced overall budget under the Computer Pool Account will impact on all Information Systems, Communications and Technology activities as AFI Division will need to operate with insufficient staffing and non-staff resources to effectively maintain IT operations and core projects. The resources foreseen in the original ZRG scenario to address increased systems security threats and the enhanced focus on governance, will need to be curtailed.

117. Whilst major efforts will be made to guarantee ongoing availability of network services, email, Internet/Intranet and computerized application systems, reductions in technical support to users will be unavoidable, and problem resolution will necessarily take longer, possibly resulting in more frequent and longer periods of system outages. Maintenance coverage by suppliers for the computer equipment upon which the FAO systems, including Oracle Financials and WAICENT, operate will also need to be reduced.

118. In the telecommunications area, resource constraints would have a number of negative consequences: e.g. poorer Internet access performance for FAO users and for external users in accessing FAO's website; reduced connectivity to FAOR offices; lower capability to support concurrent use of video, audio and simultaneous interpretation services in FAO meeting rooms.

119. As regards computer systems development and maintenance, there will be a major reduction in the funding available for consultants and contractors who support the development,

enhancement and maintenance of FAO systems, hence seriously lowering AFI's ability to respond to system problems and change requests.

Programme 5.2.3: Human Resources Management Services

120. The reduced budget level will affect both current service delivery and AFH's ability to deliver what has been forecast in the MTP 2004-09. The lower provision has been achieved through a combination of increases in income, elimination of posts and reductions in non-staff resources. AFH will be obliged to focus on core legal and policy advice, monitoring, staffing and recruitment, staff development and social security services, while only limited resources would remain to pursue new initiatives.

121. Some areas of priority that may be affected include: the new performance management programme; staff development activities, particularly the introduction of competency-based management and support to inter-disciplinarity; the implementation of the Oracle Human Resources Management Information package; restructuring of the GS category; organizational classification studies; legal advice on employment law to managers; participation in inter-agency fora and inter-departmental working groups; and the sensitization of managers to preventive approaches as an alternative to formal recourse procedures in the area of staff grievances.

122. Services will also be curtailed in other areas, such as management of the volunteers programme, acknowledgements to unsolicited applications, and maintenance of the Corporate Roster. Considerable reduction in services may occur, in support of staff selection panels, in the monitoring and reporting on vacancies, and towards rationalization of the FAO Administrative Manual. AFH will also consider a wider use of fee for services policy, in areas such as recruitment missions and project cycle training for decentralized offices. Within the Medical Service, reductions in non-staff resources will mean that no additional major preventative or curative activities can be undertaken, nor can any new equipment be acquired.

123. The elimination of five GS posts and one Professional post is necessary in the MSS (not apparent from the table). These abolitions will impact on the delivery of financial support services to user divisions. Help desk and training support will have to be curtailed. The review and monitoring of letters of agreement will be transferred to departments that will be required to ensure their own monitoring and control arrangements.

124. Chapter 6 covers the services, including building maintenance, mail and pouch, procurement and security, provided by the Administrative Services Division (AFS) at HQ and the provisions for similar services at the decentralized office. The reduction in resources is primarily in terms of staff, due to the fact that the largest part of the AFS provision for non-staff is allocated to cover fixed costs such as utilities and infrastructure costs, or compulsory expenditures to meet the safety and security norms and standards imposed by law. Nevertheless, non-staff provisions also had to be reduced, leading to curtailment of some infrastructure services and potential safety risks.

125. Within the infrastructure sector, the budget reflects the elimination of a number of junior level artisan and support posts. A reduction in support staff means that more services will need to be outsourced, and several posts have been proposed for upgrading to respond to the requirement for increased oversight. However, there may be an increased risk of insufficient control over vital functions such as electricity and water supply networks. In addition, no managerial flexibility would remain in these sectors. At a time when the Organization is able to attract extra-budgetary contributions to the physical upgrading of its HQ premises, it will not have the ancillary resources necessary for a proper monitoring of the works conducted by external firms acting on behalf of the various contributors.

126. Concerning messenger, mail and pouch activities, there will be reductions in portering/office move services, in the capacity to maintain publications stock, and in the handling and shipping of FAO publications. The budget also anticipates a restructuring of the FAO registry and records management process and a transfer of mailing list administration to users.

127. The cut in the procurement area will undoubtedly impact on the quality and timeliness of the services to be provided. An increase in delegation to Division Directors for local purchase authority, to relieve work pressure on the Procurement Service, will entail that procurement actions may be subject to less central control and possibly prone to some inconsistency in treatment within the Organization. The Procurement Service will have reduced ability to improve its supplier database and its utilization, and to provide timely and accurate information on its activities.

128. Only minimal reductions in non-staff resources are proposed for the management and security service activities under this Chapter. Recent audits have pointed out the gap existing between the requirements for security and safety and the current situation at FAO. However, the budgetary constraints will not allow FAO to address this gap as fully as desirable.

THE CONFERENCE,

Having considered the Director-General's Programme of Work and Budget:

- 1. <u>Approves</u> a total net Appropriation of US\$ 749,100,000 for the financial period 2004-05 and subject to paragraph 2 <u>approves</u> the Programme of Work proposed by the Director-General for 2004-05 as follows:
 - a. Appropriations are voted for the following purposes:

- b. The appropriations (gross) voted in paragraph (a) above, plus an amount of US\$ 14,100,000 to fund the amortization of After Service Medical Care, shall be financed by assessments on Member Nations, after deduction of Miscellaneous Income in the amount of US\$ 9,195,000, thus resulting in assessments against Member Nations of US\$ 850,965,000.
- c. In establishing the actual amounts of contributions to be paid by individual Member Nations, the assessment of each Member Nation shall be reduced by any amount standing to its credit in the Tax Equalization Fund provided that the credit of a Member Nation that levies taxes on the salaries, emoluments and indemnities received from FAO by staff members shall be reduced by the estimated amounts of such taxes to be reimbursed to the staff member by FAO. An estimate of US\$ 2,800,000 has been withheld for this purpose.
- d. The contributions due from Member Nations in 2004 and 2005 shall be paid in accordance with the scale adopted by the Conference at its Thirty-second Session, which contributions, after the deduction of amounts standing to the credit of Member Nations in the Tax Equalization Fund, result in net amounts payable totalling US\$ 756,805,000.

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- e. The contributions shall be established in US Dollars and Euro and shall consist of US\$ 341,601,000 and € 348,911,000, which represents approximately 45% to be paid in US Dollars and 55% in Euro.
- f. The foregoing appropriations are calculated at the rate of $\pounds 1 = US \$ 1.19$.
- 2. <u>**Requests**</u> the Director-General to make proposals to adjust the approved Programme of Work, bearing in mind the expression of priorities by Council and Conference as well as the criteria for priority setting originally established by the Council at its 110th Session and as reviewed by the Programme Committee at its 89th Session, to the next meetings of the Programme and Finance Committees and to their Joint Meeting for their approval.
- 3. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to make proposals to the Finance Committee for the reallocation of arrears, the use of which was subject to Conference Resolution 6/2001, to cover one-time redeployment and separation costs associated with the implementation of this budget reduction.
