### CONTEXT

The United Nations Decade on Ecosystem Restoration is a huge opportunity to restore millions of hectares of degraded land worldwide by 2030. 2 billion hectares of the world's deforested and degraded landscapes, an area larger than South America, have potential for forest and landscape restoration (FLR). Healthy ecosystems provide food, medicines and building materials and are essential to human life. FLR and ecosystem restoration, in general, has the capacity to generate essential economic, social and environmental benefits.

This session will present lessons learned from ongoing successful initiatives of FLR, with a focus on various restoration practices, governance schemes in multiple contexts/ecosystems, ranging from assisted natural restoration to tree growing approaches. This session will also strive to build on the main FLR programmes, such as The Restoration Initiative (TRI) to assess good practices in terms of the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration, and propose a road map to continue forward.

This session will focus on lessons learned that need to be systematized to achieve at scale global restoration targets involving the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration by 2030.
