## DRAFT REVISED STANDARD FOR GLUTEN-FREE FOODS <br> - Comments at Step 6 of the Procedure -

Adverse reactions to gluten reported in Sweden, 1992-1998
Consumers' complaints over adverse reactions have lead to analysis of the suspected offending food and documentation of these cases. Since 1992 we have been informed of 12 cases, where consumers have reacted.

Contamination of the raw material or during production

Contamination during production. Gluten content was $5 \%$ in one piece of "band" pasta found in the package

Contamination during production

The manufacturer had "forgotten" to declare the ingredient wheat flour

The ingredient (gluten or wheat flour) was not declared

Misleading declaration.
The ingredient label says rice crisps, the picture shows wheat crisps

The rice had been treated with gluten, this was not declared

Naturally gluten free product, contaminated with wheat gluten

Falsely labelled as gluten free alternatively contaminated with wheat

## Estimation of the amount of gluten, causing adverse reactions

In seven of these cases, shown in the above table, we have also been able to estimate the amount of ingested gluten causing the adverse reaction. It was found that sensitive individuals might react at a dose of as little as $7-10 \mathrm{mg}$ gluten.
