As you know, the blue economy falls squarely into the mandate of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations. My organization's role in the context of blue economy is to provide technical support to FAO member states for the development, governance and sustainable utilization of the blue economy (fisheries, aquaculture and their associated value chains) to enhance food security, decent work and poverty alleviation.

As we put a renewed emphasis on the blue economy, we should not forget that it is faced with a number of challenges including dwindling of fish stocks due to overfishing, climate change, pollution, illegal, unregulated, unlicenced fishing, use of inappropriate fishing gear, and others.

The challenges I have mentioned above, can and should be addressed. The potential of the blue economy is immense. In 2016 fisheries alone employed 59.6 million people. Globally, demand for fish is increasing, the aquaculture sub-sector, now valued at 243.5 billion USD, is growing faster than other major food production sectors. We must build on this opportunities for the prosperity of our communities.
