
This is the conference for you!

You are invited to the 17th Biennial Conference of the Australian Rangeland Society where you will join a lively mix of natural resource professionals, managers of rangeland for grazing, tourism, conservation and cultural purposes, scientists and students to discuss the rangeland, its use and management.

Rangeland, which make up more than 80 per cent of the Australian continent, has unique values and management issues framed by deep cultural connections, immense scale, precious ecosystems, unforgiving climate and sparse social capital.

Country is intrinsic to Aboriginal peoples and culture. The Australian Rangeland Society recognises the traditional owners of the land on which we will meet. Although Kununurra is a young town it sits on lands that have been significant to Aboriginal people for tens of thousands of years.

Kununurra provides a fitting location for a conference on the theme of ***celebrating diversity: people, place and purpose***.



People With a base population of around 5,000 which swells during the dry season, Kununurra's people include traditional owners, farmers, pastoralists, miners, service industry workers and visitors. The town is a focus for economic and social activities throughout the Ord River Catchment.

Place In and around Kununurra you can find ancient and diverse landscapes, waterways, irrigated agriculture, the urban life of a township, biodiversity in abundance, one of the world's biggest diamond mines and outback pastoral stations .

Purpose From pastoralism and agriculture, traditional use and tourism, conservation and resource development.

Call for papers

Expressions of interest are invited for the presentation of oral and poster papers addressing the theme of ***celebrating diversity: people, place and purpose***. Papers for oral presentation will be selected on a competitive basis and all papers will be considered for presentation during poster sessions. Suggested topics are indicative and not restrictive. Case studies of innovative production or organisational systems that address key topics are particularly welcome.

Expressions of interests are due by **Monday 12 March 2012**.

Authors will be advised of acceptance shortly after this date. Completed papers and abstracts will be due in May 2012.

At least one author is expected to attend the conference.

All papers will be available in the conference proceedings, which will be produced in electronic format. A selection of papers from the conference will be reviewed by an editorial panel for inclusion in a themed issue of *The Rangeland Journal*.


