

Statement by Dr. Claudia Sadoff, Executive Managing Director, CGIAR CFS 50 Ministerial Segment, 10 October 2022

Excellencies

Distinguished colleagues

The **food systems crisis** which has been discussed at length here today is **just one element** of a complex set of challenges with connections to **every other system underpinning human life**.

Our best hope in meeting the **immediate demands** of the current crises and building resilience to **future shocks** lies in **confronting that complexity** with **evidence-based innovation** and **collaboration**.

CGIAR, as many of you know, is the **world's largest public international food systems** research and innovation network.

We are proud of our **global footprint and track record**, but we are **being tested** to rise to this complexity.

It's why we have embarked on a **transition towards a more efficient and integrated structure**.

The mission of 'One' CGIAR is to **transform food, land, and water systems** to deliver sustainable food and nutrition security for all.

Our **Research and Innovation Strategy** outlines three **Action Areas** to enable this global transition.

In the Action Area of 'Genetic Innovation' we focus on conserving and delivering genetic resources, producing better, more demand-responsive seed varieties while also slowing the loss of genetic variation.

The transition to One CGIAR will enable genebanks to **expand their research and innovation efforts** and support a **strengthening of the capacity of national programs**, while at the same time **continuing to distribute germplasm to recipients around the world**.

In the Action Area of 'Resilient Agrifood Systems' we address the need to increase sustainable agricultural productivity and the availability of safe, nutrient-dense foods; reduce threats to human health; and strengthen the resilience of smallholder agriculture.

Lastly in the Action Area of 'Systems Transformation' we look at broad scale challenges like natural resources and environmental impacts; livelihoods, markets and farmers' vulnerability to shocks; diets; and inequality.

To achieve **scale and impact** across these three domains, we work with more than **3,000** partners.

These partnerships, particularly in the global South, are increasingly a driving force behind our reform efforts as we try to better position CGIAR to respond to today's challenges by bringing down silos within CGIAR and taking a more systems focused approach.

In the context of the current food crisis, this enables us to take **swifter action** to **identify**, **understand**, **and counter** the immediate impacts on food and nutrition security in key affected regions.

All while progressing our longer-term goals toward **the equitable and sustainable food systems** that humankind, and the planet, need.

In closing let me underscore this message – for 50 years CGIAR has been a **key science partner** and we **remain committed to working with all of you** to meet the challenges of this crisis, and the challenges the future may bring.
