The development of the Soil Atlas of Asia is one of the core activities in the ASP Implementation Plan as highlighted during the Third ASP Workshop in December 2016 held at Bangkok, Thailand.



The Atlas, which would be jointly produced by the JRC – EC is envisage to provide a better understanding and appreciation of the importance of soils in the Region. Specifically, it intends to: 1) Raise the awareness of the general public, land managers/owners, policy makers, politicians, NGOs and other scientific communities on the importance of soil; 2. Support policies and instruments for investment, agriculture, environmental issues, climate change, development and aid assistance, urban planning and others; 3. Provide educational material to schools and universities to support learning; and 4) Provide baseline information for further assessments.

This Meeting therefore, is an opportune time to discuss the scope, structure and content of this very important book, as well as the contribution and responsibilities of each country to further solidify our partnership for this significant endeavor.

We thank the JRC-EC and the GSP-FAO for extending the invitation to the Philippines to host the kick-off meeting of the Editorial Board. It is indeed an honor and privilege.

At this juncture, The Philippine - Department of Agriculture through the Bureau of Soils and Water Management (BSWM), reiterates our commitment to the ASP. We share your vision; we share your purpose; we share your action.
