







Detailed Programme of the High Level Policy Dialogue

Introduction

The main objective of the High Level Policy Dialogue is to unlock the potential of rainwater harvesting (RWH) in its broadest sense and demonstrate the importance of RWH with respect to the following:

- Climate variability and change: negative impact on smallholder farmers and possible solutions;
- Food security: the importance of RWH and small-scale irrigation; and
- WASH: Household water security through rainwater harvesting

The expected results include the sharing of tangible approaches and techniques on how to integrate rainwater into policies and increase the understanding of the relevance of water buffering. The major output of the Policy Dialogue will be a Symposium Declaration. Key messages, policy recommendations and technical options will be identified and presented at the last day of the Policy Dialogue. The policy recommendations and technical options will be further elaborated in the Write Shop on Day 3 and 4 of the Symposium.
