#### How has the project helped improve country and organisational practices related to integrated programming for nutrition?

In the September E-Newsletter, we announced we had launched an online survey to assess the impact of regional training workshops in the Horn of Africa and in the Sahel. More than 60 of you sent us feedback. Thank you again for your participation! The results show that the workshops have been instrumental in promoting integrated interventions in both regions and within your organizations. 84% of the respondents said they have used the knowledge from the regional workshop in their daily work. #### Looking back on two successful workshops in South-Sudan

Western Bahr el Ghazal State and Warrap State took nutrition and food security agendas further a few days ago! Two sub-national workshops were held in Wau (26 to 28 November) and Kujoc (2 to 4 December) and both allowed more than 20 people to gather in order to discuss and share around nutrition and food security joint programming. There was a combination of government and humanitarian nutrition and food security professionals working in emergency and resilience-building programming in Western Bahr el Ghazal as well as members of the food security and nutrition clusters. #### A step forward to integrated programming for nutrition in Chad

Further to the two sub-regional workshops held in October, another similar workshop, called "Agreeing on causes of malnutrition for joint action" was organised and attended by national actors as well as actors from the 5 regions most affected by malnutrition. This workshop gathered 50 professionals working in different sectors, with a strong participation from the ministries and state technical services, international and local NGOs. The ICN2, held 19-21 November 2014, came with much fanfare and success. Bringing together some 2200 participants from over 169 countries, it focused on how nutrition challenges should be collectively addressed by state and non-state to raise levels of nutrition and standards of living of the people. 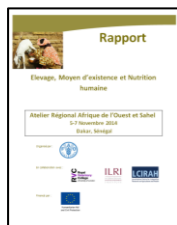
### Two new country experiences shared on the project website
