Bushmeat: biting the hands that feed

In tropical areas worldwide, the meat of wild animals (bushmeat) has long been a part of the staple diet of forest-dwelling peoples. Contrary to a popular view, this cultural preference is not a matter of lack of awareness or entrepreneurship. It relates ultimately to the low productivity of domestic livestock in tropical forest conditions, and the high risks and investment costs associated with such husbandry. Wild harvest is often the most accessible and sustainable form of protein source.
